LOTS OF MAPLE SYRUP

Prices Remain High-Butter a Little Easier, With Eggs Up Half Cent.

The expectations of the buyers and the majority of farmers were not reached on the local market this morning. It was expected that the attendance today would exceed that of any other day this season with the exception of Saturday, as farm-

ers will at once begin seeding operations. The feature of today's market was the large supply of maple syrup, over 350 gallons being on sale. Notwithstanding the fact that this was practically the last offering, the demand was dull at \$1.35 to \$1.50 per gallon.

The dairy market was exceedingly small, only a scattering of farmers' wives being present in the dairy hall. Crock butter was quoted at 26 to 27 cents per pound, while rolls ranged in price from 27 to 30 cents per pound. Creamery butter was firm at 28 to 30 cents. Eggs were slightly higher, the prices advancing half a cent

Apples, as usual, were offered in fairly large quantities, with the price firm. Potatoes were plentiful, but the majority of the loads were disposed of before noon at the prices which prevailed on Tuesday, 90 cents, wholesale, and 95 cents to \$1 per single bag.

The supply of hay and oats was small today, and it is expected a large supply will be offered on Friday to fill the demand, which will become acute once the farmers start seeding. The twenty loads of hay brought in found a ready market at the prices of yesterday. Oats were firm at \$1.25 to \$1.30 per hundredweight. Dressed hogs were slow at \$12 to \$12.25
