

SERGEANT COOKSON OF "FATS" PRAISED FOR HIS GALLANTRY

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, June 30.—A member of the "Fats" Patricia, signing himself "One of Those Left," writes to the Times today to call attention to Sergeant Cookson's gallantry during the fierce fighting in May.

"This man," he writes, "deserves the greatest honor for his unflinching and conspicuous gallantry during the whole of those terrible days, as it was indeed chiefly owing to his coolness and intrepid courage that Lieutenant Niven, Major Gault, D. S. O., had been rescued out of the jaws of the enemy."

"It was Sergeant Cookson who got the vital dispatch through for reinforcements and brought them up when victory was called for on this perilous task, and I guess no one living to tell the tale of those days of real hell will ever deny the justice of honoring this brave man who fought as a Gordon Highlander in South Africa, with those who have given prominence to his name."

THINKS CANADA MIGHT PROVIDE MORE MUNITIONS

N. W. Rowell, M.P., Addresses Canadian Club at Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, June 29.—N. W. Rowell, speaker before the Canadian Club this afternoon on "British and German Munitions," declared that the British Government was wrong in Canada, that the country was not making more munitions. Britain was straining every nerve, even drawing men from the front and putting women in factories to make munitions. Yet in Canada many men capable of making munitions were out of work and the production was well below what it might be. He urged a greater production of munitions.

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SING SING WARDEN REFUSES TO ATTEND AN ELECTROCUTION

[Canadian Press.] Oshington, N. Y., June 30.—A protest against capital punishment, Thomas M. Osborne, warden of Sing Sing prison, did not attend the electrocution of Joseph Ferri at Sing Sing today. Mr. Osborne went to New York last night, and his place at the execution was taken by Deputy Warden Johnson. "I am leaving because that is the only way that I have to protest against the law which makes the execution necessary," said Mr. Osborne before going.

Ferri, the previous death for shooting and killing his brother-in-law, Florentino di Giovanni, with whom he worked at times as a gardener at their home in Inwood, L. I., on August 21, 1911. They had a dispute over a debt, and after a fight with fists on the street Ferri shot home, got his revolver and joined the group which had gathered around Giovanni, and shot him through the head. Gov. Whitman refused to show clemency to Ferri, and the jurors who convicted him signed a petition in the condemned man's behalf.

Question of Motives of His Money Transactions Discussed by Witnesses.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, June 30.—Several members of the Canadian community gave evidence today on behalf of Mackenzie, journalist, sued by W. T. R. Preston on account of his cable columns to Canada on Preston's book, "Strathcona's Life." Col. Donald Armour, Strathcona's friend, said the book was regarded as a venomous attack upon the dead man.

Abraham May, secretary to Lady Strathcona, thought the general opinion here was the bitterness of the book defeated the object with which it was written.

CONDEMNED BOOK
