MAJOR J. R. MEREDITH TO BE BURIED IN TORONTO

Body on Way Across Ocean—Full Military Honors To Be Paid.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—Full military honors will be paid at the funeral of the late Major J. R. Meredith, 95th Battalion, son of Chief Justice Sir William R. Meredith, who occurred suddenly at a London hotel on November 27. Gen. Logie learned today that the late officer's body was now on its way across the Atlantic for interment here, and headquarters are now making arrangements for the part which the military will take in the ceremony. As in the case of the funeral of the late Col. W. D. Allen, which took place last month, it is probable that the Queen's Own Rifles will be largely represented at the funeral as Major Meredith, like Col. Allen, was an officer in the Q. O. R. before proceeding overseas.

MRS. G. COLLINS' DEATH. STRATFORD, Dec. 7.—Word reached here of the death at Niagara Falls, N.Y., of Mrs. G. Collins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Huchison of Stratford, aged 72 years. She was born in Scotland, but came to Canada as a babe, and resided in Stratford up to sixteen years ago. Besides her husband and one son, Thomas, her parents, four brothers and one sister survive, namely: Peter and Walter, Stratford; William, Sarnia; Robert, St. Thomas; and Mrs. Ramsdell, Buffalo.

BORDEN'S TOUR DATES.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—The following are the dates of Sir Robert Borden's national service meetings in the west: Monday, December 11, at Winnipeg; Tuesday, December 12, at Saskatoon; Wednesday, December 13, at Edmonton; Friday, December 15, Vancouver; Saturday, December 16, Victoria; Monday, December 18, Calgary; Tuesday, December 19, Regina; and Friday, December 22, Toronto.

DUEL CALLED OFF.

London, Dec. 8.—The projected duel between Deputy Markoff of the Duma and President Michael Rodzianko has been abandoned, according to a Reuters dispatch from Petrograd. President Rodzianko's seconds have decided that the meeting was impossible, as the Octobrist party, to which M. Rodzianko belongs, and the other parties have resolved to ostracize Deputy Markoff.

At a recent session of the Duma Deputy Markoff, who is known as a reactionary, called President Rodzianko a babbling idiot, and the latter replied that he desired to insult the Duma in the person of the president.

Assures Series of Inter League Games With the International Teams

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 8. — T. J. Hickey of St. Paul was today elected president of the American Baseball Association, defeating President Thos. M. Chiverton, who was a candidate for re-election. Hickey was the first president of the association when it was organized in 1902. The vote was 5 to 3.

After the election of T. J. Hickey of Minneapolis to succeed President Thos. M. Chiverton of Chicago, the association took action at the annual meeting here today, which practically assured a series of inter-league games with International League. The question of a third major league, as proposed, to consist of four American Association and four International League clubs, was discussed informally. President Hickey, who took the chair shortly after being elected, announced, but added that the matter did not take the proposed league seriously.

President Edward G. Barrow, of the International League, in a telegram, approved the plan for an inter-league series, and invited the American Association club owners to attend the inter-league meeting in New York next Monday. President Hickey wired Mr. Barrow that a committee, consisting of himself, Wathen, Hamilton, Thomer, J. C. McGill of Indianapolis, and John W. Norton of St. Paul, would attend, with power to act for the other three club owners, Roger Brannan of Toledo, George Tobson of Kansas City, and E. M. Schoenborn of Columbus, who could not make the trip.

The plan for the inter-league series, as explained by President Hickey, calls for each club in the two leagues to put up \$500, a total of \$8,000, before August 1, this to be apportioned at the end of the season among the clubs winning the greater number of games.

With the Trotters and Pacers

Peter Scott has been retired, and will make his home in Kentucky. He should do well in the stud.

The Walnut Hall farm will try for another Lee Axworthy. The sire and the dam of this horse belong to this organization.

Boavista, 2:16 1/4, a recent purchase by Montreal parties, will race once this winter.

Directum Spier, with Lucille Spier, broke into the honor role. She is slated for the big times next year.

Zombro, a mighty promising sire, has been retired to his stud. He is quite a horse.

George Walsh, Tillsonburg, has arrived home with his two horses, Bertha Walsh, 2:14 1/4, and All Abaze, 2:18 1/4, after a good season. His two mares, green last fall, were turned around at the Western Fair a little education, and the past summer they were sent out for the money. At London Bertha Walsh was second in 1915, beating such good ones as Elsie Overwood, 2:09 1/4, Paddy B., 2:11 1/4, and some other fast ones. All Abaze got third money in the green trot. They followed the Canadian circuit for a while. Bertha Walsh was second in the pace, winning the first heat, second at Tillsonburg, also winning a heat, won in straight heats at Woodstock, and repeated at Aylmer, her best time being 2:14 1/4. At St. Thomas, she went against the 2:19 crowd, but had an accident, and did not get in the money. Bertha Walsh won the 2:25 pace in straight heats. At Dresden she took the free-for-all bunch along in the same fashion. At Thamesville, she bumped into Prince Humphrey, 2:14 1/4, and had to take second money. At the Detroit state fair, she was second to Musselshell, in the stake, the heats being paced by 2:11 1/4. She took all her races at the Stratfordville, Woodstock, Tillsonburg and Simcoe fairs, beating a good bunch of wiggles.

All Abaze, a nice-going trotter, started in the Tillsonburg meet of the Canadian circuit, taking second money. At Woodstock she was third to Sarah Douglas and Sanatell. She won a heat at Aylmer, but was beaten out for first place. She was third at St. Thomas in a five-heat race. One of her best performances was at the Detroit state fair, when she finished second to Florence Belmont. In a five-heat race, her places being 2:11 1/4, 2:12 1/4, 2:13 1/4, 2:14 1/4, and 2:15 1/4. There were fourteen in the race. Later she won at Chatham, second at Tillsonburg fair.

Bertha Walsh started fourteen times, won seven races, was second twice, and third once.

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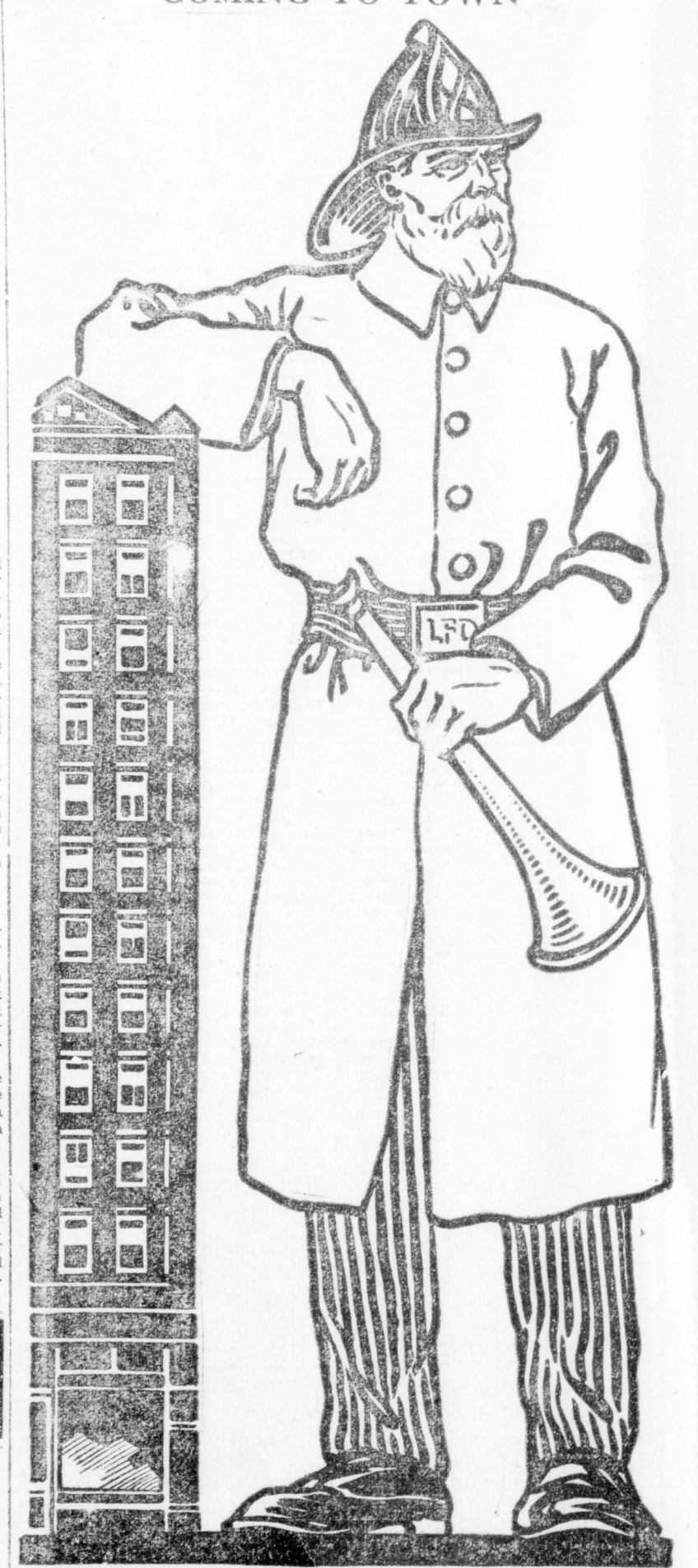
