ALLIES FEAR ANOTHER WAR AS RESULT OF SOVIET SUCCESSES

British Government and War
Officials Rush to Paris.

FOR A CONSULTATION

Bolsheviki, Flushed With Victory,
May Extend Their
Activities.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—Before peace with Germany is a week old the British public has been brought up sharply against the possibility of another war. Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, Walter Ransome Long, first lord of the admiralty, sir Henry H. Wilson, chief of the imperial staff, left tonight, having been hurriedly summoned to Paris for a consultation with the French premier, Georges Clemenceau, and other British officials there on important military and naval matters.

This summons is inevitably connected in the public mind with the semi-official statement published today calling attention to the threatening situation in the middle east as a result of Bolshevik military successes, which have given the Soviets virtual mastery over the whole of European Russia, for, although it is not yet confirmed that they have entered Odessa, it is believed it cannot be long before they are in full possession of these coast regions.

Enormous Supplies.
By their victories the Bolsheviks have secured command of enormous supplies of food, raw materials, coal and rolling stock and other means of transport they formerly were in need of.

Speculation is active in the European capitals as to what will be the next move of the Bolsheviks. It is regarded as certain that, flushed with success, they will not be content with their present conquests, but will seek to extend Bolshevik rule eastward or westward. Expert military opinion inclines to the belief that their next move will be an attack on Poland and the Baltic states, and Warsaw dispatches to the London papers already indicate that the Poles are fully anticipating such a move.

Formidable Forces.
The Soviets now undoubtedly command formidable forces, but not sufficient to warrant an attempt to advance both east and west. Against the likelihood of an attack on Poland, which, it is said, will be popular with the Red generals, is the fact that the Bolsheviks would be exposed on the north to an attack by the Letts and on the south to an attack by the Rumanians.

Commerce Board Member
Says Clothing Makers
Charge Too Much.

READY-TO-WEAR CLOTHES

Retail Merchants Ask Amend-
ments To Order Limiting
Profits On Some Lines.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—(By the Canadian Press.)—Representatives of the clothing section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada waited upon Judge Robson, chief commissioner of the board of commerce, this morning and presented a resolution passed unanimously at a meeting of the Dominion board of the association, making for amendments to the order respecting ready-to-wear and partly made suits and overcoats.

The resolution asks that the order limiting the gross profit to 33 1/3 per cent of the sale price shall not apply to suits or overcoats of extreme style. It asks also an allowance of \$2 a suit or overcoat to cover the cost of altering, finishing or to make the garment ready for the purchaser.

Judge Robson asked the delegation a number of questions, designed to get at the effect of the tariff on clothing prices. The chief commissioner stated that it might be necessary for the board to go to the trouble of making a special trip to the United States in order to find out what clothing prices were there.

Judge Robson also stated that he would not advocate a reduction in the tariff for the purpose of allowing American goods in, but, he said, "the manufacturer is taking advantage of the tariff and making us pay too much. If you bring the tariff down a little you will bring the manufacturer's price down without letting the American stuff in."

OFFICIALS UNEARTH SHIP-YARD FRAUD OF BILLION DOLLARS

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 15.—

Frauds involving many millions of dollars in connection with the building of ships for the Government in Oregon, Washington and California, have been unearthed by Government investigators. The Government, according to information by authoritative sources, is alleged to have been defrauded of more than a billion dollars through a conspiracy working by the payment of false vouchers for sums that ship builders obtained illegally.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—Premier Clemenceau has accepted the nomination for the presidency of the republic. It was announced tonight.

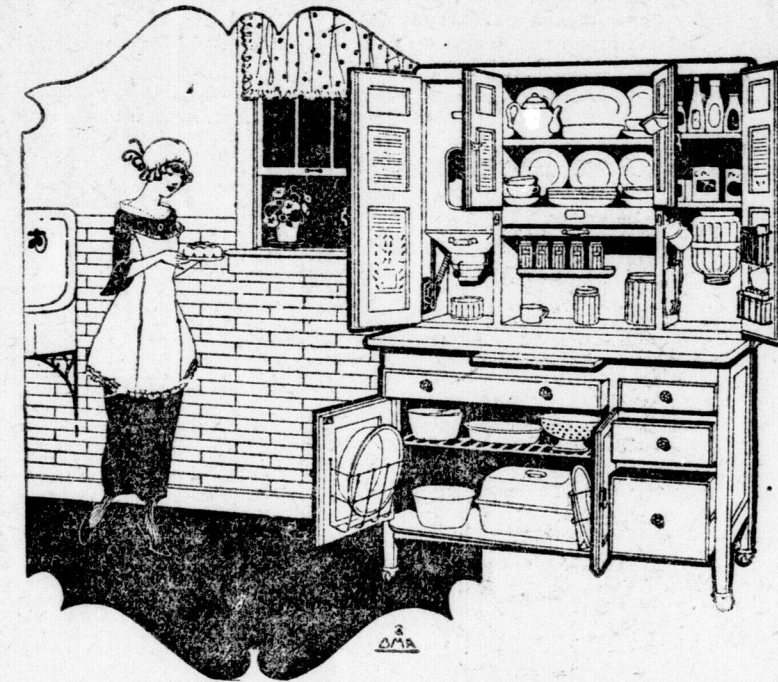
M. Clemenceau formally authorized his supporters to place his name before the plenary caucus of the congress of Versailles tomorrow, and promised that, if elected, he would accept the mandate entrusted to him.

Supporters of the premier immediately decided to order ballots printed bearing M. Clemenceau's name. These will be distributed among the voters at Versailles on Saturday, when the assembly convenes.

Tonight's announcement was the first definite information that Premier Clemenceau would stand as a candidate, although it had been assumed generally that he would run for the office, or at least would not refuse to serve if elected.

One of the supporters of M. Clemenceau told the Associated Press that the premier would have refrained from a public declaration had there been no opposition to his candidacy.

VACANT PORTFOLIOS NOT LIKELY TO BE FILLED UNTIL RETURN OF PREMIER BORDEN

Sir George Foster Has No
Comments To Make On
Rumors.

DEPARTMENTS MERGED

Guthrie and McLean Are Men-
tioned For Post of Pub-
lic Works.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—(By Canadian Press.)—Definite retirement of Hon. S. C. Mewburn from the cabinet has started the usual crop of political rumors. There are now two vacant portfolios—those of the department of public works and of militia and defence. In regard to the first named, Sir George Foster, acting prime minister, observed today that he was not responsible for gossip and knew nothing of either rumors.

So far, however, arrangements made are as follows:
Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration, becomes acting minister of militia, and there is a likelihood that his appointment will be made permanent. Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways and canals, is also appointed acting minister of public works. Since administration of Government railways was placed in the hands of the Dominion Railway Company, the work of the railway department has been considerably reduced. In regard to both of the vacant portfolios, however, Sir Robert Borden announced before his departure that they were unlikely to be filled until his return.

The merging of a number of public departments is planned with a consequent reduction in the number of cabinet portfolios.

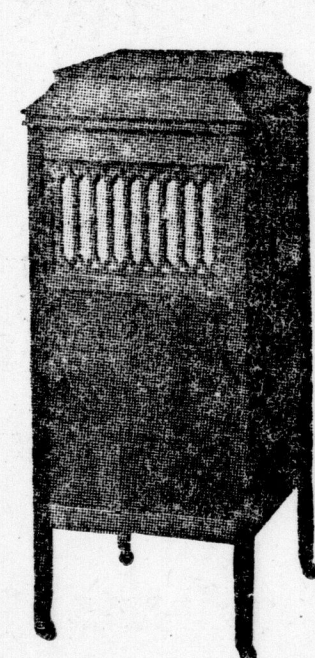
ARGUMENT ENDS IN

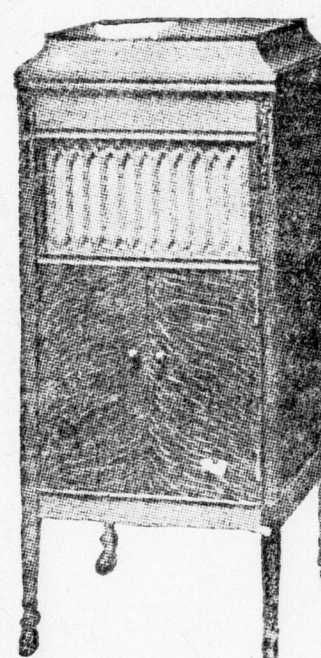
