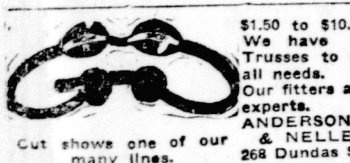

**TAX OFFICERS HAVE
PROBLEMS GALORE**

**Many Want To Settle Debts
With Lump Sum.**
Many and various are the problems that
the officials of the federal taxation
office in this city are called upon to
solve, adding much to the task of
collecting the instalments of the in-
come tax. Each day brings requests
from people who are anxious to know how
much they still owe.
The department has found it impos-
sible to answer many of these questions
because all information has not been
compiled at the present time. Those
who have expressed desire to pay the
balance of their tax in a lump sum
have been advised to have their esti-
mation on the returns they made in
April for as a rule they will be found
approximately correct.
Many large checks have been received
in payment of the second instal-
ments, but there have been compara-
tively few small amounts paid in, and
still fewer callers at the office up to
the present time, as a majority of the
payments have been made by mail.

**FIRST RAINFALL IN
3 WEEKS AT GRANTON**

**Splendid Shower Yesterday
Was of Great Help To
Grain and Roots.**

GRANTON, June 27.—The splendid
shower this morning was more than
welcome all through this district, it
being the first moisture to amount to
anything in three weeks. The crops
were beginning to suffer from the long
dry spell, fall wheat, oats and barley.
As it is the oats will be very short.
Most of the early oats has headed out
and will be a poor yield.
Corn and roots are in excellent shape
and will benefit greatly by the rain to-
day. The hay crop is light all over and
but for the sweet clover that farmers
are cutting the food supplies would be
somewhat low.
Grass cattle have not been doing well
as the steady heat and the flies have
been hard on them.
Several farmers have fields plowed for
wheat this fall, while many others are
ready to plow if enough rain comes.
Noonan & Hardy shipped a carload
of hogs to Buffalo on Friday, and J. T.
Scott a car of cattle to Toronto on Sat-
urday.
The anniversary services held in the

largely attended. A festival is planned
for the church grounds on Dominion
Day. On Sunday next the Masons will
march to church and a special sermon
will be preached to them by Major
Angus Graham of London.

**WORK STARTING ON
NEW "Y" GYMNASIUM**
Locker Accommodation For
1,500 Members Is To Be
Provided.

Work on the new gymnasium in the
local Y. M. C. A. will be started im-
mediately as the result of a decision
reached at a recent meeting of the
directors. The contract for turning
the auditorium into a first class "gym"
has been awarded to R. G. Watson &
Son.
The new gymnasium will measure 50
feet by 62 feet. It will be particularly
well suited for basketball for the floor
will be of standard size. There will
also be accommodation for 300 specta-
tors, while the new equipment will
more than double the accommodation
for volleyball and other games.
Under the new system, locker accom-
modation for 1,500 members will be
provided instead of for only 400 as at
present. No extra fee will be charged
for the lockers.
It was decided, however, to raise the
association membership fees to the fol-
lowing amounts:

Age 10-11 years—\$3.50.
Age 12-14 years—\$5.00.
Age 15-17 years—\$6.00.
Young Men.
Age 18-20 years—\$8.00.
Age 21 years—\$10.00.
Seniors.
Age 22 and over—\$12.00.
Business men—\$25.00.
These new fees go into effect at once.
It is expected that the gymnasium will
be ready for use about September 1.

AT THE ALLEN.
Selfish pride dragging others to the
gutter is the keynote about which a
strong drama is built in "Inside the
Cup," a Paramount film, showing at the

The story deals with that class of hu-

in search of his sweetheart, vowing to
disgrace the name of Parr, which is
prized so much.
Conditions grow worse, and finally
when Garvin, in the depths of despair
at starvation of his family, shoots El-
don Parr, the congregation of the
Church of which he is a member is led
to see things in their true light, and
with the assistance of a new and young
rector, the inside of the cup is cleaned
of its filth. Preston Parr, who has be-
come a devotee of humanity, returns
home and meets his sweetheart once
more, and the regeneration occurs.
This vehicle, which is the screen

ous novel of the same name, is a
masterpiece, an all-star cast adding
greatly to its effectiveness. A Shub

**FRACTURED SHOULDER
WHEN CYCLE HIT TREE**
Mounted Policeman Badly
Hurt in Accident At
Warwick.

SARNIA, June 27.—Thomas Lynch, a
mounted policeman, and C. W. Routh,
aged 22, both of Sarnia, sustaining in-
juries today, when the motorcycle on
which they were riding got out of con-
trol in a gravel pile on the London
road near Warwick village, and they
crashed into a tree at the side of the
road. Routh, whose home is in Wood-
stock, was accompanying Officer Lynch
in the side of the department motor-
cycle on a trip to Woodstock, where
Lynch was going to transact official
business. They were proceeding at a
moderate speed. The mounted police-
man, in trying to get to the other side
of the road, fed the engine more gas,
and it jumped and hit the tree. Lynch
has a broken shoulder bone and severe
shock, while Routh suffered a broken
leg.

**TRIAL OF BALL PLAYERS
IS POSTPONED**

CHICAGO, June 27.—The trial of 18
baseball players and alleged gamblers
indicted in connection with the 1919
world series scandal, went over until
Wednesday today after ten of the de-
fendants had appeared in court for the
opening of the trial.
The delay was caused by Judge
Friend's ruling that Carl Zerk of St.
Louis, one of the defendants, must be
in court on Wednesday morning.
Counsel for Zerk and for Ben Frank-
lin, another defendant, had presented
affidavits that their clients were too ill
to appear. Judge Friend also ordered
the state to report on Franklin's con-
dition at the same time.

**WHEAT CUTTING TO
BEGIN THIS WEEK**
Big Yield of Splendid Grain
Will Be Saved Around
Hyde Park.

HYDE PARK, June 27.—Wheat cut-
ting will commence in this district in
a few days and is expected to be gen-
