

TORY PAPER HAS SPLEEN OUT ON BEATEN LEADER

Montreal Star Says He Refused to Co-Operate With Empire.

TOO MUCH SOCIALISM

Old Political Leaders Would Scorn State Ownership Ideas.

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—The Conservative press has been much worried in its endeavor to find excuses for defeat. The Gazette, which predicted a government triumph, now concedes it was taken for granted by those in the inner ring of Conservatism that the government would go down. The Star turns and rends the party for its departure from Conservative traditions, especially in the matter of railroad nationalization.

The Star asks: "What has happened? Why have its latest leaders so signally lost the confidence of the country? These are questions which the genuine friends of all essential Conservative principles should today solemnly ask themselves, and as solemnly seek an answer. The Canadian people have not turned away from even a hybrid variation of the good old Conservative party without some compelling reason or reasons, and it is high time that the men who still venerate the names of Macdonald and Cartier, of Tupper and Thompson, of a long and honorable roll of leaders who maintained the same principles and fought under the same banners, should look frankly in the face and search fearlessly for the fundamental errors which caused yesterday's debacle.

Socialism Creeps In.
"They have not far to seek. They have, indeed, been already pointed by those of us who still cherish the teachings, the traditions and the patriotic impulses of the fathers. To begin with, the men who call themselves 'Conservative' when the term meant something definite, would never have dreamed of falling a victim to that discredited and ruinous fantasy of the most demerited form of socialism, viz., government ownership of railways. Imagine Sir John Macdonald confronted with the proposal that he should import this already-failed experiment, this discarded from a dozen countries, bitten by the enemies of socialism into the Dominion of Canada. Imagine with what scorn he would have rejected it.

"That was Conservatism. That was the battle for the safe and sane, the intelligently progressive, to which the people of Canada rallied again and again. But when this citadel of sound economics was abandoned by the new leaders of the old parties how could those to whom Conservative principles were cherished realities possibly escape that discouragement and disaffection whose final effects were registered yesterday? Any effort to graft one of the shallowest and most completely exploded outputs of radicalism on the ramparts, onto the stout old trunk of settled Conservatism was bound to be a dismal failure, politically. Sir James Whitney and Sir William Hearst tried it in Ontario. And the triumphant farmers came in. Mr. Meighen and his colleagues have tried it at Ottawa, and now the Liberals and the Farmers fling them into third place."

The Star Raps Them.
The Star also accuses the premier of departing from Sir John Macdonald's fixed Conservative principle of close co-operation with the British Empire, and instances Mr. Meighen's embarrassment of the British government by his refusal to accept the British, Australian and South African policy, regarding the Japanese Alliance, which

ELECTION REVIVES TARIFF QUESTIONS

Results in Much Speculation by United States Politicians.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—There is much speculation today among members of Congress as to the possible effect of the elections on tariff relations between the United States and Canada.

Expedient interest is being taken in the situation by members of the house ways and means committee, which has jurisdiction over tariff matters. Despite the fact that Premier Meighen, who openly advocated high tariff for Canada, had been defeated, some authorities in certain circles express the view it would be difficult to revise reciprocity or bring about mutually low tariffs.

Representative W. R. Green of the house ways and means committee said the real difficulty would be "to find a place to start." He said with United States farmers and manufacturers both insisting on high tariffs, he did not see how reciprocity could be revived.

Others take the view that if the Harding administration is given the broad powers it seeks in handling tariffs, the new government in Canada will be able to achieve much in keeping down tariff barriers by negotiating with the president.

SETTLERS SEEK HAVEN IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—A movement of settlers from the British Isles to Canada, limited only by Canada's ability to absorb them, is predicted by W. J. Black, deputy minister of the department of immigration and colonization, who has just returned from six weeks spent in the British Isles and Europe in connection with immigration matters.

Mr. Black's investigations covered, besides principal points in Great Britain, such centres of Antwerp, Brussels, The Hague and Warsaw.

"The British people recognize that they face a problem of over-population," said Mr. Black, upon his arrival here. "The amount of over-population in the British Isles is freely estimated at from ten to fifteen millions and the question of finding for these people a means of livelihood and independence in other countries, preferably within the British Empire, is one which is engaging the best British attention. Canada can be assured of hearty and effective co-operation in any policy which will help to meet this situation and at the same time insure to the incoming settlers possibilities of bettering his condition."

PRESIDENT TO STAY.

CABINET IDEAS ARE SPROUTING

Montreal Has a Number of Suggestions for Liberal Government.

GOVIN MUCH IN FAVOR

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—Places in the coming Mackenzie King Government are conceded in speculation in the city to Sir Lomer Gouin, who is talked of in connection with the public works department; Hon. Walter Mitchell, former minister of finance, and Joseph Archambault, for the speakership.

In connection with the lieutenant-governorship of the province, a position that will shortly be vacant, the name of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux is freely mentioned.

Hon. Dr. Beland and Ernest Lapointe are both slated for cabinet positions. Hon. Jacques Bureau will probably accept a position on the bench, while A. R. McMaster may possibly be made solicitor-general.

LINDSAY, Ont., Dec. 7.—(By Canadian Press.)—Results of polling in out-lying subdivisions received late this afternoon, indicate that Victoria-Haliburton, represented in Parliament for many years by the late Sir Sam Hughes, has swung into the Progressive column.

The fight in this constituency has been particularly close between T. H. Stinson, Conservative, and J. J. Thurstin, Progressive, latest reports giving the latter a majority of 94, with returns incomplete.

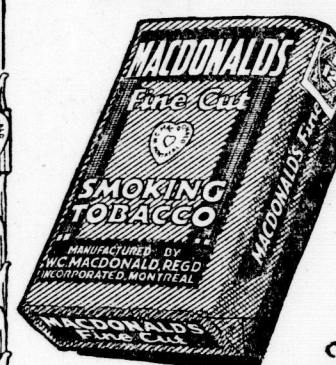
BURNED TO DEATH IN GAS EXPLOSION

A Job For Every Man Prosperity For All.

Progress is an essential condition of mankind's power over nature.

THE opportunity for advancement during the 20th Century in Science, Art, Industry, Commerce, Law and Learning, in relation to human welfare is peculiarly Canadian. The Dominion of Canada covers a vast area, and reliable research shows that our material resources are stupendous. While our population is comparatively a small one, the will to work and the power to achieve are characteristic of the spirit and training of the Canadian people. With this great heritage the people of Ontario should not be content to either tolerate or condone a condition whereby masses of our material resources are undeveloped and large numbers of our people are unemployed.

In the Great War, Canada won her nationhood by sacrifice and devotion, and now she must maintain it by work and wisdom. The vital need of the world today is the production, distribution and exchange of goods. To have fields, factories and workshops curtailing production, and workers in semi-idleness, is a condition unworthy of the statesmanship and common sense of the Canadian people.

Plan of Co-operation.

The Provincial Advisory Committee on Unemployment considered the industrial situation and endorses the following statement of proposals:—

- 1.—That Manufacturers should be asked to take a price for goods on hand equal to the cost of replacement having regard to decreased cost of raw material and of labor used in manufacture.
- 2.—That Wholesalers should be asked to sell goods on hand at replacement prices.
- 3.—That Retailers should be asked to sell at replacement prices.
- 4.—Knowing that the costs of building at the present time have been considerably reduced, those desiring to build should be encouraged to ask for new tenders on their proposed work; and that building contractors and builders supply people should make a special effort to reduce prices to a minimum in order to restore this important key industry.
- 5.—That Banks and financial institutions should be prepared to co-operate to the utmost with all productive enterprise by allowing all reasonable credits and by decreasing rates as rapidly as conditions may allow.
- 6.—That Farmers should be asked to maintain reasonable production, and in the event of a proportionate reduction being reached in other lines, should be prepared to make needed improvements and betterments.
- 7.—That Labor should be asked to take willingly a reduction in wages proportionate to progressive decrease in cost of living, in so far as such a reduction has not already taken place.

The above statement has been submitted to and endorsed by the following interests—manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, building industries, agriculture, financial interests and the veterans.

The National Debt of Canada is considerably over two billion dollars, but our financial prestige must be maintained, our loans repaid, our power to attract capital unimpaired, our workers kept in steady and congenial employment, our duty to disabled soldiers and their dependents fulfilled.

To successfully accomplish these tasks the production, distribution and exchange of goods and performance of services must be kept at the highest point of efficiency, costs and profits consistent with safe business practices brought to the irreducible minimum,—waste eliminated,—co-operation between employers and employees encouraged.

Canada's basic industries, such as agriculture, lumbering, and mining produce quantities of grain, lumber and minerals far

in excess of present Canadian requirements, and those industries, in conjunction with our manufacturing interests, should be encouraged to maintain their productivity and dispose of their goods in the markets of the world as well as in the home market.

Inflated prices and high wages should disappear. The task of promoting trade and reducing the volume of unemployment is a gigantic one, but the banker, builder, farmer, worker, manufacturer, wholesaler, retailer, the municipality and other interests can co-operate to stabilize industry and create employment.

Let each individual and every group of employers or employees resolve to assist in stimulating industry and commerce. Let unity prevail and conditions will improve. Ontario, the Bank of Canada, and the example.
