REPORT FAIR BUSINESS

Street Railway Shareholders Appoint Officers At Annual Meeting.

[Special to London Advertiser.] SARNIA, Ont., Jan. 25.—Accounts amounting to \$140 for the payment of Joseph Lozier and George McDonald, police spotters, employed by Chief of Police Lannin, were brought up at this afternoon's meeting by the finance committee and passed for payment following a lengthy argument.

The production of the accounts brought out a considerable volume of adverse criticism from several members of the council on the employment of spotters to assist the police in enforcing the Ontario temperance act.

Mayor George Crawford said he thought the accounts should be passed as the police commission, apparently approved of the methods employed to haul in liquor traffic.

ers, and this action was eventually taken, but it was also hinted that this action may, so far as the council is concerned, end the reign of especially enlisted liquor spotters in Sarnia.

May Get Factory.
The only other item of interest at the meeting was the reading of an extract from a letter received from financial interests who are negotiating for the location of a tractor factory for the grant of a 15-acre plot as a factory site, and exemption from taxation.

Sarnia may yet get a branch line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, according to a chamber of commerce report made public by William T. Kenny of the T. W. Kenny Company, who announced that in a recent letter received from the head of the road, he was informed Sarnia has not been forgotten.

The communication received from President E. W. Beatty of the C. P. R. was to the effect that all hopes of running a branch line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from London to Sarnia have not been abandoned. A year ago President Beatty of the C. P. R. visited Sarnia personally, and reviewed the situation. No report of his tour of inspection was received here until this week, when in a letter he stated that hopes were still held out for giving Sarnia a branch of the C. P. R.

Officers Are Elected.
The annual shareholders' meeting of the Sarnia Street Railway was held here today, and the following officers elected: President, Col. Robert MacKenzie; vice-president, Randall Kenny; secretary-treasurer and manager, G. E. Wadland; auditors, H. W. Unsworth and G. W. Prangley. The directors were re-elected as follows: Col. MacKenzie, Randall Kenny, Charles S. Ellis, Malcolm MacKenzie, R. V. Lesueur, M.P.; W. R. Paul and John Sinclair, London.

The year 1921 was reported as being a fair business year, though not so good as the previous twelve months. Traffic to the factories in the south end of the city fell off considerably owing largely to unemployment conditions. On the other hand traffic to the beach was of larger volume than in any previous year.

DECLARES 2,000,000 UNEMPLOYED IN BRITAIN

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Stephen Leacock, humorist and professor of political economy in McGill University, is in New York today on his way back to Montreal from a visit to Europe. Prof. Leacock arrived on the French liner La Lorraine yesterday.

"In England," he told an interviewer here, "there were 2,000,000 idle before Christmas and it will be difficult to raise funds in the contemplated budget to take care of them, although drastic cuts have been made by the 'Geddes axe.'"

Farmers' Party In Australia Is Like Progressives In Dominion

LONDON, Jan. 25.—A Reuter cable from Melbourne announces that a Labor member named Charlton succeeds the late F. G. Tudor as leader of the Opposition in the Federal Parliament.

Besides the Labor forces, the Hughes' Nationalist Coalition government finds itself opposed by the Farmers' Union party, corresponding somewhat to the Progressives in Canada.

The Farmers now hold twelve seats. Premier Hughes has been head of the government for six years. He took office as a "true blue" Labor leader, but after the split in the Labor ranks in 1916, he formed the Nationalist Coalition party, to which the Liberal group also gave friendly support.

In an address delivered today, Premier W. M. Hughes advocates throwing open the door of Australia to people of the British race. Then the world, he said, would stand behind a "white Australia" policy.

ASKS THAT LIQUOR ACT LETTERS BE PRODUCED

Quebec, Jan. 25.—Amadee Monet, Liberal member of the Quebec assembly for Napierville, has given notice of a motion for the production of all correspondence between the government and Hon. G. A. Simard, chairman of the Quebec Liquor Commission, relative to the enforcement of the liquor act.

Last week a number of Liberal members waited on Premier Taschereau and asked for the dismissal of Mr. Simard. When Mr. Monet's motion comes up later in the session, a lively debate is expected.

MASSEY-HARRIS HEAD LEAVES LARGE ESTATE

TORONTO, Jan. 25.—Thomas Findlay, manufacturer, and president of the Massey-Harris Company, Limited, who died in this city on Dec. 19, left an estate of \$165,237.15.

AIMS TO REVIVE LIBERAL PARTY

LONDON, Jan. 25.—(By Canadian Press Cable)—An illustration of the chaotic condition the political parties of the United Kingdom are in is afforded by a statement of Lord Robert Cecil, who still styles himself a Conservative, although he was elected as a coalitionist in the last general elections, but subsequently developed strong antipathy to the economic and foreign policies of the government.

In a speech delivered at a Liberal demonstration on Monday Viscount Grey was given an ovation when he said his reason for returning to public life was that he felt it absolutely essential "to restore wholesome and straightforward policies in this country by reviving the Liberal party."

KING CABINET READY TO DEAL WITH PROBLEM

Session Discusses Proportion of Cost To Be Carried by Ottawa.

PROVINCES TO HELP

Special Consideration To Be Given To The Returned Soldiers.

OTTAWA, Jan. 25.—(By Canadian Press).—Measures for the relief of unemployment and distress throughout Canada, the necessary funds to be provided by governor-general's warrant, were approved by the federal government this evening.

The regulations cover the period to the end of the current fiscal year, March 31, and provide for federal assistance to municipalities undertaking civic works during the winter months; to municipalities on account of unemployment where work cannot be provided, and for the relief of distress in unorganized districts.

A special feature of the regulations is that in the case of unemployed former members of the Canadian or British forces now in Canada, and who are discharged physically fit, the government will reimburse municipal authorities to the extent of one-half the disbursements made for unemployment relief, the provincial and municipal authorities to bear the remaining half.

Has Wide Range.

In the case of public works undertaken by a municipality with a view to the relief of unemployment, the regulations provide that the municipality must bear the normal cost, plus one-sixth of the extra cost. The government will pay one-half of the extra cost, and the province one-third.

The federal grant is conditional on the province assuming one-third of such expenditures, and the estimate of normal cost must be approved by the federal department of public works.

Where work cannot be provided, and conditional upon the participation of the province concerned, the federal government will refund to the municipality one-third of the disbursements made on account of unemployment relief. Soldiers coming under the special provisions are not to be dealt with in this particular regulation.

In provinces where there are unorganized districts without municipal government, in which unemployment or distress exists, and the provincial government finds it necessary to administer a system of unemployment relief, the federal government will reimburse the provincial government to the extent of one-half of such disbursement.

The Clause in Detail.
Under the special provision for relief for returned soldiers, the regulations provide that in the case of unemployed former members of the Canadian or

British forces now in Canada discharged as physically fit, or not entitled to assistance by the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, the federal government will reimburse the municipal authorities to the extent of one-half the disbursements made for unemployment relief, the remaining quota to be contributed in equal parts by the province and municipalities, respectively.

The regulations do not seek to meet the case of disabled members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force and other classes of soldiers which fall within the jurisdiction of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment; or of persons whose necessities do not clearly arise from inability to secure employment, and with whose necessities the municipal authorities have been accustomed to deal.

People Must Have Food.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King stated in connection with the regulations it was the expectation of the federal authorities that the measures would be interpreted broadly and generously by the municipalities and the provinces "so that no resident of Canada willing to work and unable to secure employment shall lack food, clothing or shelter for himself or herself and dependents."

The prime minister pointed out that when the present administration assumed office it found that a condition of unemployment, beginning in the late months of 1920, and continuing throughout the year 1921, did not promise any material abatement during the early winter months of 1922.

The view was concurred in that the question of unemployment relief was fundamentally a municipal and provincial responsibility, and that the abnormal economic and industrial conditions now existing and arising in a measure out of the late war, alone afforded justification for action on the part of the federal authorities. This action was intended to supplement municipal and provincial efforts, and was designed on lines permitting close and effective co-operation with, and supervision by, municipal and provincial authorities, and would be proportioned by their efforts.
