CITY GAS BILLS AWAIT FATE OF RATE BOOST

Will Complete Sewer In London West In 10 Days

CITY ENGINEER CLAIMS SYSTEM **ALMOST READY**

Official Declares Cost of Work "Away Less" Than Estimate of \$520,000.

SERVES ENTIRE DISTRICT Westerly Limit of Breakwater Only Portion Not Included.

a period of ten days, citizens of West London will be provided with a sanitary sewer system which has taken about one year to complete, and is the first municipal sanitary sewer provided for the district. Such was the announcement of City Engineer H. A. Brazier Wednesday, who states that according to present plans, the pumping station this system will be initially oper ated by the end of next week. important improvement to West London was estimated to cost \$520,-000, but the engineer states that the actual cost is "away less."

Not Available at Present.

Figures on the actual cost of this system which will serve residences on every street in West London with Local Railway Workers Look the exception of unpopulated sections on the city limits are not available at present.

Operation of the new pumping sta on situated at Douglas and Cavendish streets indicates that every house served by the sewer system y be connected up with the city pipes this month. This means increased value for West London residential property by the addition of sewer conveniences, which of that district.

The sections not served by the sanitary sewers are those streets on the city limits, one side of which are in the township, and a section the north bank of the river, west of the westerly limit of the break-

The latter section is known as the flats and although, three streets have been surveyed there, Mr. Brazier points out that no residences have een built because this area is flooded by the Thames overflowing

We hope to have the system co pleted and the pumping station in of the Grand Trunk car men of Canoperation by the end of next week," said Mr. Brazier Wednesday. "That means that practically every house in West London can be connected up with the street sewer immediately after that time."

Will Not Be Ready.

"The section this side of the river along Thames street, which is to be connected with the London West sanitary sewer system, will not be ready because siphons across the river at York and Dundas streets are not completed. However this will not interfere with London West."

"In London West there is one sec-tion not served, which is the flats outside the west limit of the breakwater. This section of two or three streets is below the water mark, and is flooded every year. There are no houses in that area."

The sewer which proceeds along Thames street across the river to the London West system, serves a portion of London South in the vicinity of Ridout and York street bridges.


