RIOT AT CLEVELAND.

Two Men Shot to Death by a Sheriff's Posse-Mob

Fired First. Cleveland, O., July 1.—The strike at the quarries of the Cleveland Stone Company to-day resulted in the shooting to death of Vinton Machusski and the fatal wounding of John Meloski, who cannot survive the night. HARRIET BEECHER STOWE

THE FAMOUS AUTHORESS PASS-ES AWAY.

Died of Brain Troubles-Sketch of the Career of a Noble Woman-The Authoress of "Uncle Tom's Cabin"-A Literary Reputation at Home and Abroad.

Hartford, Conn., July 1.—Harriet Beecher Stowe, the famous authoress, is dead. She had been suffering from congestion of the brain and paralysis, and had been unconscious since yesterday. She passed peacefully away at noon, surrounded by the members

of her family. Harriet Beecher Stowe was the third daughter and sixth child of Rev. Lyman and Rosanna Foote Beecher, of Litchfield, Conn. She was about 4 years old when her mother died. That she was no ordinary child was evident enough at an early age. Fancy
