"This being the case, the question is almost inevitable that those for whom the hospitals are not intended will have to be cared for elsewhere."

"What was needed," Dr. Adams said, "was combined action on the part of all the medical societies of the city. A resolution just passed by the Montreal Medical-Chirurgical Society was adopted by the English-speaking medical men. The English towns at the present time under the name of Charity Organization, and now proposed by Sir James Spence, are doing much in London. A list of applications for admission to the various hospitals is immediately forwarded to the Charity Organization Committee, and by means of its inspectors in the various districts full acquaintance is obtained with all cases who would be patients."
