President Vetoes Bill to Grant Privilege on Stream in Missouri

Washington, Jan. 15.—President posevelt today sent a special message to the House with his veto of the bill providing for the construction of a dam across the James river in Stone county, Missouri, the purpose of the dam being to get water to create electric power.
