WELL PLEASED WITH INTERVIEW

Executive of G. W. Veterans' Asso-
ciation and Sir L.
Gouin.

Quebec, Dec. 24.—The executive of
the Great Veterans' Association wait-
ed on Sir Lomer Gouin at his office
at the Parliament buildings yesterday
afternoon, for the purpose of placing
before him a request for certain con-
cessions by the Provincial Govern-
ment which, if granted, will be a great
aid to the association in its work of
finding employment for returned sol-
diers; also, the purpose of laying be-
fore the Premier a memorandum on
land settlement whereby soldiers in
the Province of Quebec will have the
same advantages as those in other
provinces, and for other important
matters.

The delegation was introduced to
the Premier by Mr. Arthur Gannon,
M. P. P.

Sir Lomer Gouin listened attentively
to the memorial and gave the dele-
gates every hope of having them
granted. He promised that the ques-
tion of increasing the subsidy would
be taken at an early date by the cabi-
net and that he would strongly re-
commend to the cabinet all the points
brought out by the delegates, who re-
quired pleased with the results of their
interview.
