SEEMS TO BE ANGRYAssails Federal Government on
S.S. Matter and Says Royals
Were Stolen Away.Halifax, N. S., Nov. 14.—The Chron-
icle, Liberal, in an editorial under the
caption "Halifax Sold Out," says Hon.
Mr. Hazen's announcement that the
Royal Liners will be sent to the port
of St. John during the coming winter,
affords a fresh illustration of the way
in which the present government jugs
the business interests of the coun-
try to serve partisan ends. For the
first time in the history of Canada,
since the Liberal policy of sending
trans-Atlantic mails through Cana-
dian ports was inaugurated, Halifax
loses at least half the trans-Atlantic
mail service. The announcement made
by Mr. Hazen at St. John was not un-
expected. For weeks past there has
been rumors of a "deal" between the
Government and the Canadian North-
ern, and, in spite of the emphatic den-
ials repeatedly issued by Mr. Hanna,
of the Canadian Northern, it was well
known that the Government was try-
ing to make a "deal" by which the
Royal Line steamers would be stolen
away from the port of Halifax. The
"deal" has now been "pulled off" suc-
cessfully, and Halifax, which from the
inception of the Royal Line's trans-
Atlantic service has been the winter
terminus of the Royal Edward and
the Royal George, is to lose two fine
steamers. The trumpety excuse put
forward by apologists for the Govern-
ment's trickery, that the Royal Line
is withdrawing its boats from Halifax
because of lack of accommodation at
this port, has not a vestige of founda-
tion. In fact, as we have shown re-
peatedly in the discussion of the win-
ter mail service, Halifax possesses
ample facilities to accommodate the
Royal Liners and all the steamers
scheduled to make this port their ter-
minus, or port of call during the com-
ing season. The simple fact is that
the Royal Liners had been forced by
the Government to change their whole
winter arrangements, to abandon Hal-
ifax and to send their steamers to the
port of St. John for political reasons.It is admitted that the interests of
the Royal Line lie in Halifax. Sir Wil-
liam McKenzie has stated publicly and
privately in the most emphatic terms
that Halifax was to be the permanent
port of the Royal Line. Mr. Hanna
re-affirmed this determination on the
part of his company in the mysterious
telegrams which were issued at the
very time that the pressure was being
applied to the Canadian Northern to
abandon the port of Halifax. The
"cruel fact" of the story is that the
interests of Halifax have been sacrific-
ed in the hope of saving the political
skin of the Hon. Mr. Hazen in the City
of St. John.It is not a question of antagonism
between this port and the port of St.
John. There should be nothing but
the friendliest feelings and co-opera-
tion between the two cities. There is
room enough for both to grow and
prosper in friendly rivalry. But char-
ity begins at home, and the forcing of
Royal Liners to leave Halifax, with
which they have been associated ever
since the inception of the service, is
a blow at the prestige and business
interests of this port.ANOTHER MYSTERY
OF SEA SOLVEDSkeletons Found of a Crew of
Vessel Missing 24 YearsSan Francisco, Nov. 16.—Another
mystery of the sea is thought to have
been solved in a story brought to this
port-to-day of the discovery of the
British ship Marlborough, which has
been missing for twenty-four years.
The ship, aground on the rocks,
skeletons of her crew of thirty men
have been found in a cove near Punta
Arenas, Patagonia. Evidence pointed
to a fight with the natives, who, after
murdering the crew, despoiled the
vessel of its cargo.The human bones, scattered cut-

story of the massacre. The ship's log
was not decipherable.The story was brought by the mas-
ter of a sailing vessel who sighted the
Marlborough and boarded her en

OF APPLE TREESUseful Precautions to Prevent
Injury to Young Trees
From VerminPrecautions must be taken to pre-
vent injury from mice, rabbits, etc.
Many failures in apple growing here
and elsewhere are caused by these
pests and a large annual toll in the
form of dead trees is annually exacted
by them. As far as possible pro-
tecting and attracting such pests
should be avoided and the accumu-
lation of litter, trash, weeds, long grass,
etc., which furnish suitable winter
quarters for these animals, prevented.
Mice work under the snow and damage
from them may be prevented by
tramping the snow round the tree
after the first few snowfalls. This
method of protecting is, however,
is somewhat dependent on the weath-
er. The cheapest and safest protec-
tion is secured by wrapping the trunk
cylinder fashion with paper, good ven-
eer or some such material. Good
strong building paper, as light as pos-
sible in color gives good satisfaction.
This may be placed round the trees in
the fall, not tightly, but leaving an
inch or so of space between the inside
of the paper and the bark of the tree.
The soil should then be mounded up
around the bottom of the paper to a
height of six inches or so. Veneer tree
protectors, made of thin material, one-
eighth inch thick, 12 inches high, 12
inches wide, and costing about 1-2 cent
each will last two or three years and
afford good protection. The paper or
veneer, as the case may be, should be
removed in the spring, about the mid-
dle of April.

SUN SCALD

This form of damage is very com-
mon in some localities, so common, in
fact, that a tree which escapes it is a
rarity. The greater part of the dam-
age occurs in late winter, or during the
warm spring days when the snow is
going off. During the warm after-
noons the sun, reflected from the snow
against the south-west side of the tree
trunks, becomes very warm. The
trunks are thoroughly warmed on that
side. They are thawed out, and the
bark becomes soft, sappy and pliable.
Then, when the sun goes down and the
temperature falls again to zero, the
bark is again frozen tight. The next
day the same thing happens, and so
day after day the young bark freezes
and thaws, and by this means is torn
to shreds. When spring arrives the
bark is killed and broken open. Then
various kind of fungi gets in and the
damage which begins by freezing and
thawing ends with spread of canker
and other troubles all round the trunk
of the tree. The best preventives of
sun scald are low heads and veneer
and paper cylinder protectors. High-
headed trees, which are of double value
anywhere, are altogether undesirable
in places where sun scald is bad. The
protectors of paper or wood veneer re-
commended above for mice and rabbits
will also give practical immunity from
sun scald. This trouble is a very ser-
ious one. It is not uncommon to find
entire young orchards ruined by it. On
sections where this trouble is prevail-
ent great pains should be taken to
protect young orchards from it. For

ACCEPTS CALL TO N. B.Rev. Thos Harrison of Longueuil
Will Take up New Duties
AT BoabecMontreal, Nov. 12.—An interesting
incident in the meeting of the Mont-
real Presbytery was the appearance of
three adepts of the Presbytery
church of Longueuil, who whilst ex-
pedient the call of their minister,
Rev. Thomas Harrison, to a church of
Boabec, Charlevoix county (N. B.),
made it the occasion of an earnest ap-
peal individually to the presbytery to
assist them in securing soon another
minister of equal ability to Mr. Harri-
son, as some recompense for the loss
the congregation had sustained by his
departure.Mr. Charlton, ruling elder, stated
that their church had sunk to a Sun-
day's attendance of about five mem-
bers when Rev. Mr. Harrison came
three years ago, and now it had in-
creased so as to comfortably fill it.
His departure would be sadly missed
and the speaker hoped some effort
would be made by the presbytery to
put the best man into his place, as
the Presbytery church of Longueuil
was becoming one of the first churches
on the south side of Montreal, and its
reputation would increase.The Rev. Mr. Harrison is a native of
the North of Ireland, and a graduate
of Durham College of Science, New-
castle-on-Tyne. He has had much ex-
perience as a university coach. He
prepared scholars in economics at Bel-
fast, where they numbered as many as
120 in his class room—for entrance in-
to Ruskin College, Oxford.For four years he was tutor in the
high school at Cairo, Egypt, a com-
mercial academy established by Eng-
lish residents. Mr. Harrison has
preached in many churches in the Old
Country.The new minister expects to leave
for Boabec in a fortnight.
