RAFTING LOGS BY ELECTRICITY

Modern Methods Being Employed By Nashwaak Company.

Electricity is being used as power for rafting purposes, for the first time in New Brunswick, by the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company, at the mouth of the Nashwaak River, when rafts of timber are made up for shipment to St. John. Power for the motors used in the operations is supplied from the power lines from the Maritime Electric Company plant, in this city, whose lines extend across the St. John River to Devon for distribution.

MAN KILLED ON R. R. TRACK

William W. Craig of Chatham Struck By Ocean Limited Near Moncton.

William Wallace Craig, aged 30 years, a Sergeant Major in the Salvation Army at Sackville, was almost instantly killed near the Sunny Brae railway crossing and directly in front of the old Sunny Brae skating rink, this afternoon, when he was hit by the Ocean Limited Express, Number 1, West Bound. He was proceeding towards the city from Sunny Brae where he had had dinner with Mr. H. H. Stuart, principal of the Sunny Brae School.

Deceased arrived from Sackville this morning in search of employment, his work having ended in Sackville on Saturday evening. He was a tinsmith by trade. On arrival here he visited the stores of Summer Co. Ltd. and the shop of Cosman and Son, Mechanic Street. He was to have called upon Mr. Cosman this afternoon again, and was enroute to visit Mr. Cosman's business place when he was struck by Ocean Limited. He left Mr. Stuart's shortly before 2 o'clock. Mr. Stuart being a friend of the deceased having met him in Chatham where he formerly resided. He was a relative of some of Mr. Stuart's relatives.

After the accident the ambulance met the Ocean Limited at the C.N.R. station, but the deceased expired before reaching the hospital.

The driver of the train was Robert Colquhoun, fireman, Walter Kelly. The fireman first observed a man near the tracks, but before the train could be stopped it had hit Mr. Craig. When the train was stopped deceased was placed on board the train and rushed to the city, but he died a short time afterwards. He expired in the ambulance on the way to the hospital. It is believed the bumper of the engine hit deceased, there being a deep cut on the right side of the face and on the left side of the head deceased sustained a serious cut. The right arm was broken and the wind pipe fractured.

TORONTO TO BRITISH COLUMBIA

Impressions of the Trip With the Canadian Weekly Press Association Party.

EDMONTON. Monday, June 20.—Everything was busy and bustling in the city this morning as many expected to meet old friends in Edmonton. There was quite a rush at breakfast and despite the fact that the staff of the dinner would be held, and breakfast had been announced early, some were still at it when our special pulled into the depot at Edmonton.

I wish to say it is no light task to feed about one hundred and forty hungry men. Sharp on time, and it is remarkable how our train keeps right to the schedule, we arrived at Edmonton. The station platform was crowded with citizens, many anxiously looking about for expected friends among our party, who when found were carried off to waiting autos and then taken to the homes in the city or to the Macdonald hotel, which was to be our headquarters while in Edmonton. Autos were provided for all, and soon we were virtually in possession of this large modern hotel.

As some of our party had been travelling for a full week we were inclined to get into comfortable lounge rooms, where we could remove the grim of a week's travel and feel refreshed. We had an hour or two to ourselves, and it was very pleasant to be able to do this.

The writer, after a general cleanup of his baggage, then takes up the glories of the city and country. Edmonton, the capital of Alberta, is beautifully situated on the high banks of the Saskatchewan river, which can be seen winding its way among the low hills for miles. The river is crossed by a number of fine bridges and the city extends along both banks of the river. Because of its geographical position, Edmonton has long been the centre of trade for the great west. Over a hundred years ago the Hudson Bay Company built a post at this point, and the handsome parliament buildings now grace the site. In 1900 when the C.N.R. reached the city there were about 1,000 inhabitants, now there are 65,000. Its buildings are up-to-date, and it has miles of paved streets. Edmonton like every other western city that we visited or heard of has suffered from the real estate speculation. The city is spread over miles of prairie, with vacant lots and factory sites in abundance. This all tends to make the tax rate high, and we found that rates of four, five and even six dollars of the hundred were common in the west, whereas at home in the east the rate should climb to three we are loud in the condemnation of the ruling powers. However the city is making progress, and with recent developments in the north country where oil and gold have recently been discovered, Edmonton expects to be, in the next few years, the Seattle of Canada. My but the people are optimistic. Every citizen you meet is alike in describing in glowing terms the greatness and the possibilities of the west. It does seem too bad for the east that most of the boosters have gone to the west, we need them back east.

SUNFLOWERS AS A SILAGE CROP.

Much interest is being taken both in Canada and the United States in the value of sunflowers as a silage crop, particularly in district where corn is not a reliable crop. The claim is made that sunflowers are a hardier crop than corn, withstanding both drought and frost to a greater degree. Insofar as the claim put forth for sunflowers as a food for cattle are virtually of recent origin, experiments and investigation regarding them are practically in an introductory stage. It is interesting to note, however, that an analysis of sunflowers silage fed at an Idaho agricultural experimental station indicated that it compared favourably with corn silage. In Canada also studies of the relative value of sunflowers and corn for silage purposes suggest that in nutrition there is not any great differences, although corn is to be preferred where it can be plentifully and easily grown. Where this is not the case, sunflowers are an excellent substitute.

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
