MUNICIPAL CONTRIBUTIONS

As will be seen from the reports of the County Council published in these pages, the Municipality of Restigouche has done splendidly in the matter of contributions to the Patriotic and to the Belgian Relief Funds.

The vote of \$250 per month to the Patriotic Fund marks the County Council as being fully alive to the necessities of the times, and should claim a high place in the honors in this province if not in the dominion. Very few public bodies or municipalities have made a grant of this size which means a contribution of \$3000 to the Patriotic Fund and \$1000 to the Belgian Relief Fund.

Restigouche can hold up her head among all the nations as having done her part and done it well, first in the number of volunteers, and the generous response to the various appeals, and now in the handsome donation from the County Council. No wonder we can step high.

STEAMSHIP SERVICE

Owing to the unsatisfactory conditions obtaining last year in the Gaspe service it behoves all the interested parties along the Bay Chaleur route to get in line with the purpose of the Campbellton Board of Trade, and insist upon having at least some kind of satisfactory service.

The request of the company to institute an extra service from Montreal should be fought strongly and efforts brought to bear to re-instate the former bi-weekly service from Campbellton to Gaspe. The Board of Trade, and the merchants here would gladly see the increased subsidy given for a service the same as in previous years, but they in company with the business men of the Gaspe coast will use every endeavour even to a delegation to Ottawa, to see that this Montreal end of the sailing is cut out. The subsidy was granted in past years for a service from Campbellton to Gaspe and there has not transpired anything to change this rule laid down. This matter ought to receive the earnest consideration of every business man along the coast.

Dalhousie. Addresses in English and French were then read to the Rev. Fr. Wallace, and a presentation made of a Golden Chalice and altar ornaments of cloth of gold, these offerings being responded to by both Fr. Wallace and Bishop O'Leary.

After the celebration dinner was served to the visiting clergy at the Hotel Dieu, where his brother priests presented Fr. Wallace with an address in English and French accompanied by a purse of gold presented by Mc Geo. St. Onge, and his brother clergy in Restigouche presented him with a Missal. Rev. Fr. Wallace replied to these presentations in fitting terms. In the afternoon at 2:30 the school children gave a concert in the school building and which was repeated on Wednesday evening by special request. At this entertainment addresses in English and French were again presented to the rev. jubilarian and responded to by Rev. Fr. Wallace, Bishop O'Leary, Rev. Superior of Carleton College, and Rev. Fr. Finnegan of St. Thomas College.

On Tuesday evening about 300 guests sat down to a well appointed banquet in the Hotel Dieu, which was served under the personal direction of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Gorman of the Waverly Hotel. Dr. Pinault, who was president of the committee of entertainment occupied the chair. The menu was as follows:

THE DEATH OF AGED CAMPBELLTON LADY

Miss Mary Bucknerfield Passes Away on Tuesday.—Funeral Held Today

On Tuesday morning there passed away at the home of Mrs. Barbara Wellington Street, one of Campbellton's highly respected and aged ladies in the person of Miss Mary Bucknerfield, who was in her 88th year. The deceased lady, who was much of an invalid following an accident met with some years ago, when coming out of church, retained all her faculties almost up to the hour of her death.

Miss Bucknerfield was born in England and came to Canada when eleven years old, and has resided here for nearly fifty years, coming to Campbellton with the late Oliver Arnold Barbare as governess to his family, when he was appointed the first government agent here.

She was the first Sunday school teacher in Campbellton and was a past president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England, and two years ago in recognition of her services was made a life member of the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England in Canada.

Miss Bucknerfield was a staunch member of the Church of England, and was a highly educated lady and a great student.

The funeral was held today a large number of mourners being present. Services were conducted at the home of Mrs. Barbara, and later the church service was held in Christ church, both services being conducted by Rev. J. Purdie. Interment was made in Campbellton Rural Cemetery, the pall-bearers being Messrs. Thos. Wren, J. H. Wilson, W. F. Napier, Alfred Fraser, Thos. R. Busted and A. A. Andrew.
