THE BRITISH CABINET.

Kept of its Doings.
From the Wesk.
The most enthusiastic admirers of British constitution will not deny that the machinery of government is complex, in many respects anomalous, and is very little understood outside the charmed circle. For instance, in spite of its political importance, the cabinet is not recognized by any court of law in the kingdom and no record is kept of its decisions. It is infornally summoned by a card calling "her najesty's servants to meet to day." leliberations are purely informal, no votes are taken, and the greatest secrecy is observed as to whatever transpires. No served as to whatever transpires. No masonic secret is more religiously kept than the result of a meeting of the cabinet, it being a strict point of honor with its members not to reveal its proceedings. This is absolutely necessary, as it is imperative for it to present an appearance of solidarity to parliament. It was originally a meeting of the most trusted members of the privy council who assembled in the king's "cabinet" or private room. Since the time of the early Hanoverian kings, who did not attend because of their ignorance of the English language, it has not been customary for the reigning monarch to be present. Vanity Fair thus writes: monarch to be present.

A cabinet council may thus meet when, A cabinet council may thus meet when, where and how it pleases, yet, as a matter of convenience, its meetings are commonly held in what is called the council chamber of the house in Downing street used as a private residence by the first lord of the treasury. The prime minister and the sccretary for foreign affairs really rule the cabinet; these two alone know everything; these two alone get all the important despatches, though each minister is supreme in his own department.

PUBLIC NOTICE Is hereby given that the City of Toronto has applied to the Ontario Legislature for an Act, entitled "An Act to empower and authorize the City of Toronto to institute an issue of Corporation Stock for Drainage Works."

The Bill proposes amongst other things:

1. To provide for the issue of \$1,500,000 (if so required) of Irredeemable City Stock for Drainage Works only; the rate of interest not to exceed five per cent, and be fixed by the bylaw authorizing the issue.

2. To limit the taxing power of the City Council to one and a half cents in the dollar on the assessed rateable property of the city for general purposes, instead of two cents, as at present authorized.

3. To limit the borrowing powers of the city to four per cent on the assessed value of all rateable property over \$50,000,000, instead of eight per cent, as authorized by the Consolidation Act of 1879.

4. The Act not to come into effect unless and until sanctioned by the vote of the electors taken as on a bylaw creating a debt.
