The Annapolis Valley Baseball League was officially organized at Middleton on Tuesday last. The League is to be composed of teams from Wolfville, Kentville, Middleton, Bridgetown and Annapolis. Mayor G. S. Keogh, of Middleton acting as president and Fred Bath, of Bridgetown, as secretary. The Executive committee is composed of one member from each Club. The winning team of the League will play off the Province for the Championship of Nova Scotia. In addition to this the D. & M. Co. have presented a silver cup to the team winning the Valley League.

Messrs Magee & Charlton, Bridgetown's well known dealers in sporting goods, will present a medal to each of the players of the winning team.

Loren Andrews, of Middleton, was appointed a delegate to the Provincial Association.

The will of the late Judge Savary left no public bequests except \$400 to Wyndlife College, Toronto.

One of the twin infant daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Reg. A. Buckler died at Annapolis on Tuesday.

The ratepayers of Digby are to vote upon a proposal to expend \$90,000 on a modern school building.

Mr. Harvey Sabean, engineer at the Power House, showed us the first trout of the season Monday morning, weight 1 pound.
