

We have received the following copy of the decision of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada:—

IN THE MATTER OF the complaint of A. L. Davidson, M.P., on behalf of the Board of Trade of Bridgetown, Nova Scotia, and the residents served by the train service on the Halifax and South-Western Railway between Middleton and Port Wade, against the discontinuance of the said Railway Company of its train service between Middleton and Port Wade: File No. 27563.26.

UPON reading what is filed in support of the complaint and on behalf of the Canadian National Railways; and upon the

report and recommendation of the Chief Operating Officer of the Board—

THE BOARD ORDERS that the Canadian National Railways be, and they are hereby, directed to restore the train service from Middleton to Port Wade, in the Province of Nova Scotia, shown in its time-table effective October 3rd, 1920.

AND THE BOARD FURTHER ORDERS that the Order on the Board No. 30724, dated March 9th, 1921, made herein, be, and it is hereby, rescinded.




