DRIVER ARTHUR A. ANDREWS.

Enlisted at the age of 26 at Halifax in January, 1916, with the Mechanical Transport Section and sailed to England with this unit a month later. Crossed to France in March and there served for three years at the hazardous duty of transporting ammunition and supplies to the front line.

SERGEANT JOHN P. ANDREWS.

Enlisted March 17th, 1916 with the 224th Forrestry Battalion and sailed for England April 15th where he was transferred to the 29th Labor Company with which he proceeded to France in the Spring of 1917. He served on the Vimy Ridge front for nine months and then was sent to Scotland in charge of a working party, with the rank of sergeant. Served in Scotland until his return to Canada in February 1919.

PRIVATE T. J. ANDREWS.

Enlisted April 13th, 1916 in the 219th Battalion "A" Company. Sailed for England the following September and to France in November with "D" Company, 13th Battalion. Was wounded at Vimy Ridge and was then returned to England for seven months. Back to the firing line in November, 1917 and wounded again at St. Pierre. To Etaples (the Base) for five months and then to the front line again, receiving his third wound at the battle of Arras. He was then sent to England and from there back to Canada. Besides being wounded three times, Private Andrews also suffered from the deadly gas fumes.

SAPPER L. G. ANDREWS.

Enlisted October 12th, 1915 in the Canadian Engineers at the early age of sixteen and sailed for England on April 27th, 1916. Served there until his return to Canada August 4th, 1918.
