

It is in demand for the local distilleries a 700 to 750 (25 6d to 3s 0d) per bushel. The supply is very limited.

OATS are very steady at 40s (2s) per bushel. Sometimes a slightly higher figure is realized, but this is about the current rate.

PEAS are not much enquired for and do not find a very ready sale at 55c (2s 9d to 3s) per bushel.

POTATOES are scarce, and good varieties bring 7 to 8 (55c to 56c) per bushel; common 50s (3s 6d). The supply on some days is very small; and occasionally 60s (3s) has been realized, but this is the exception.

APPLES—Common upper hiring 75c to \$1 (3s 9d to 5s) per bushel. By the barrel, very medium lots are held at \$3 to \$3 50 per barrel.

BUTTER—Fresh butter is more plentiful, and prices are lower, ranging from 17c to 20c (7d to 1s) per lb., with occasionally higher rates. Tub of really No. 1 quality is worth 16c (9 1/2d) per lb. No. 2 there is a large stock at 17c to 14c (7d to 6d) per lb.

CHEESE—American Cheese is firm at 8c to 10c per lb., wholesale.

EGGS are scarce, and worth from 20c to 25c (1s to 1s 3d) per dozen.

POULTRY—There continues to be a good supply of poultry, although not much in excess of the demand. Prices are steady at 1s 3d a 1s 6d per pair for Chickens 1s 10d a 2s for Ducks. For plucked Geese 1s 10d a 2s each, and for Turkeys 2s 6d a 3s each are the current figures.

PORK—For dressed pork there has been a very active demand, both for packing for home use and for shipment to Montreal. Prices have run high, and the market is very buoyant. For medium weights, say 20 lbs. \$5 a \$6 50 per 100 lbs. is paid and for very prime \$8 a \$6 25. In one or two instances as high as \$6 50 was bid, but the operation could not be repeated. The quality brought in thus far has been good, and we anticipate a good business in this department during the next few weeks. The freight to Montreal on dressed hogs is 40c per 100 lbs.

BEEF—Slaughtered beef from farmers' wagons brings \$4 a \$4 75 per 100 lbs. for hind quarters, and \$3 for fore quarters. On foot there is but a small business doing in cattle, butchers buying very low, and reserving their funds for Christmas beef. First class cattle are worth \$6, medium \$4, and inferior \$3 a \$3 50 per 100 lbs., at king one-third for shrinkage.

SHEEP are in good supply at \$3 a \$3 50 each. Lambs \$1 to a \$2 each.

HAY is plentiful at \$9 a \$11 per ton. Straw \$7 a \$10 per ton, for the best.

WOOL 2tc (1s 1d) per lb., with very little change. Sheep skins, fresh slaughtered \$1 a \$1 12 each. Best Hides \$6 25 per 100 lbs., Calf skins 6d per lb.

WOOD—The supply on the market continues abundant. From \$3 to \$3 75 are the current rates for loads of hard wood. From the woodyards medium and good wood is delivered at \$4 25 a \$4 50 per cord.

The western markets for Pork have been very buoyant for some weeks past, and high rates are current. In Cincinnati hogs weighing from 160 to 200 lbs. are firm at \$6 25 a \$6 75 per 100 lbs., and for heavier Standard even \$7 25 has been paid. The most during operation of the past week was the purchase of 10,000 dressed hogs at \$5 75 per 100 lbs., to be delivered the first two weeks in January, averaging 200 lbs. In New York, corn-fed hogs are in brisk demand at \$7 25 a \$7 50, or 100 lbs.

The Grocery market at this point is without a change. Business is only moderate, and prices remain very steady. The salt pickles are about over and, except during the holidays, a quiet demand for all kinds of goods is anticipated. The New York Sugar market is slightly depressed and prices slightly lower for some grades, but steady for Porto Rico and Cuba. The Fruit market, especially for Malaga Raisins, continues firm but without material change in prices. In other articles there is no change.

The Montreal markets are reported as follows:—Flour—Our market is quite inactive and the holders of good flour are firm at our quotations, yet to make sales of any importance, a decline of 25c to 30c per barrel would have to be submitted to. The navigation is about closed, and the stock of flour is about 75,000 barrels. In wheat, corn, barley and oats, we have no instructions to note.
