demns the English system as producing more suffering among the poor than that adopted in France. We believe the same has been the judgment of every toreigner who has any right to be heard upon the subject. This explains why it is that while other things introduced into England have so quickly been imitated in other countries, our poor-laws are without a single copyist. All nations except ourselves are unanimously of opinion that our system leads to the spending some ten times as much upon the poor as would otherwise be spent, and spending it in a manner which does the least good to the poor, and the most injury, moral as well as material, to those by whom they are supported. We have called attention to this subject because it is by making the relief of the poor a compulsory tax that the cars of all paupers is thrown exactly into the hands of the most bigoted class in England; and from this aprings our most serious grievance as Catholics. We strongly auspect that the whole system is founded, eren in its financial espect, upon a mistake. - Weekly Regieter.
