heed Aircraft Corporation of Canada is attempting to arrange to have the RB-211 engine built by a Canadian based company, what action is the government prepared to take to encourage this possible opportunity for additional work in the Canadian aircraft industry?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry. Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, I sincerely believe that it is too early for me to comment on this matter. The subject is still extremely hot and the companies involved are still looking for a way through this situation. I might observe, though, that if the project is too big for Rolls-Royce of England, with the full support of the British government, in co-operation with one of the biggest U.S. companies, to handle, it might be a bit too big for Canada too. Nevertheless, we will be looking at all avenues, Mr. Speaker.

ROLLS-ROYCE FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES—CONTRACTS HELD BY CANADIAN FIRMS RESPECTING JET ENGINES FOR LOCKHEED

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, can the minister indicate to the House the value of the contracts held by Canadian companies under the Rolls-Royce project to supply these RB-211 jet engines to Lockheed?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, I do not have that figure. I might try to find it, but I will acknowledge the fact that these contracts were very important, especially to some Canadian companies who counted on them very much.

Mr. Stanfield: Would the minister, having looked into the matter, make a statement to the House indicating the amount of the contracts, the number of people employed and what measures, if any, the government is going to take to help the companies and the men concerned to meet the problems that may arise as the result of the cancellation of these contracts?

Mr. Pepin: Mr. Speaker, I will try to include as much as I can in my answer to the question.

ACTION TO MAINTAIN COMPETITIVE POSITION IN OBTAINING EQUIPMENT
