Copy of a letter from Sir William Johnson, Bart. to Major-general Ambersh, dated Niugara 25th of July 1759.

SIR,

HAVE the honour to acquaint you by lieutenant Moncrief, Niagara furrendered to his majesty's arms the 25th instant. A detachment of twelve hundred men, with a number of Indians, under the command of Messirs. Aubry and de Lignery, collected from Detroit, Venango, and Presq' isle, made an attempt to reinforce the garrifon the 24th in the morning; but as I had intelligence of them, I made a disposition to intercept them. The evening before, I ordered the light infantry and picquets to take post on the road upon our left, leading from Niagara Falls to the fort: In the morning, I reinforced these with two companies of grenadiers, and part of the forty-fixth regiment. The action began about half an hour after nine; but they were so well received by the troops in front, and the Indians on their flank, that in an hour's time, the whole was completely ruined, all their officers made prisoners, among whom are monficure, Aubry, De Lignery, Marin, Repentini, to the number of feventeen, I cannot afcertain the number of the killed, they are fo dispersed among the woods, but their loss is great.

As this happened under the eyes of the garrison, I thought proper to fend my last summons to the commanding-officer for his surrendering which he listened to. I enclose you the capitulation; Mr. Moncrief will inform you of the state of our ammunition and provisions: I hope care will be taken to forward

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
