

Golf Hagen Beat Evans By 290 to 291

ROCHESTER PRO WINS GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

Burke of Port Arthur Leads Canadians Twenty Strokes Behind.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—Walter C. Hagen, 39 years old, native professional of Rochester, N.Y., today displaced Francis Ouimet as open golf champion of America by winning the tournament at Midlothian with a medal score of 290 for the 72 holes.

Ouimet fell off in his play, taking 293 for his total, and it fell to the lot of Charles Evans, Jr., western amateur champion, hampered by a wrenched right ankle, to furnish Hagen's chief opposition, outpacing the world's leader in a spectacular finish that electrified the huge gallery. Evans made two rounds of 71 and 76 and finished 291, just one stroke behind Hagen.

Evans' score of 141 for the day was the best double round of the tournament.

Jack Burke of Port Arthur, Ont., led the Canadian contingent with 330 in a triple tie for 14th place. W. J. Bell, Toronto, 312, was 14th in the list; and C. Cummings, Toronto, was 19th, with a card of 816.

Hagen's victory was accomplished by steady playing. Yesterday he made a record of 68 for the course by good work, aided by spectacular putting.

The new champion has not made any record outside his native city until the present tournament. He is slight in build, but follows Yardon's system of shooting straight for the flag all the time.
