LONDON, July 27, 6:17 p.m.—Apparently determined to demoralize the British fish supply as much as possible, two German submarines have appeared suddenly among the fishing fleet off the north coast of Scotland, and by shell fire sunk 12 trawlers, the Roslyn, Celtic, Cydnora, Gude, Strathmore, Honoria, Cassio, Helmoine, Sutton, Emblem, King Athelstan and Rhamrock.

In each case, a bite of a vigorous shell fire from the German underwater boats, the crews of the fishermen escaped without injury, although the men of the Honoria and the crew of the Sutton drifted in their open boats for forty and forty-five hours respectively before they picked up.

All the men were landed safely today. Many other fishing vessels have been forced to take refuge in northern harbors.

Great importance was attached to the economic advantages. Such an alliance in the opinion of the meeting should be concluded without delay and accompanied by a commercial treaty which would allow Japanese goods to enter Russian markets and replace German goods.

A number of chambers of commerce in Japan have petitioned the government asking state subvention for the encouragement of Japanese trade with Russia. From a military point of view it is pointed out that the alliance would consolidate Japanese conquest in China and would strengthen her hands in her competition with the United States.
