GENERAL RULE.

IN THE SUPREME COURT, MAY, 1860.

It is ordered, that no person shall hereafter be received as an Articled Clerk by any Barrister of this Court, until he shall have undergone an Examination at Halifax, before one of the Judges and two of the Office-Bearers of the Barristers' Society, as to his educational qualifications, such qualifications to comprehend a knowledge of Geography and of the leading events of English History, of the three first books of Cæsar's Commentaries, or the two first books of the Æneia, or an adequate portion of any other Latin Classic Author, to be approved of by the Examiners, and of the two first books of Euclid; the Examination to be conducted orally or by written questions to be answered in writing on the spot, or in both forms at the option of the Examiners; and the applicant shall also produce a certificate of his moral character from such person as the Examiners may approve, which certificate along with a certificate of the applicant's having passed a satisfactory Examination in the above branches, shall be filed with his Articles in the Office of the Prothonotary, at Halifax, pursuant to the Act of last Session.

It is ordered, that notice of the intention to apply for being received, shall be posted up by the applicant for at least one month previously, in the Prothonotary's Office, at Halifax.
