

the best critical apparatus being employed in their elucidation. When time allows, some of the works of the Fathers of the Christian Church, such as the Epistle of Clement, the Confessions of Augustine, Chrysostom on the Priesthood, and the "Cur Deus Homo" of Anselm, are perused in the original.

Lectures are given in Homiletics, and the Students are practised in the preparation of outlines of discourses, as well as in the actual composition of Sermons. Practical instruction is regularly given in reading the Service and the Holy Scriptures, the management of Sunday-Schools, and occasionally in the general duties of a Parish. Those who desire it have also an opportunity of attending lectures in Hebrew. Great advantages are afforded by the excellent collection of Theological works contained in the Library, to which all have access. Besides the regular lectures suitable books are recommended for perusal, and Students are encouraged to remain beyond the four years, a privilege of which they frequently avail themselves.

### Church and Chapel.

Every Student is required to attend the regular services, morning and afternoon, on Sunday at the Church, on the other days of the week in the College Chapel. To Students who are not members of the Church of England, permission is given to attend their own places of worship on Sunday, and they are required, at the end of each term, to exhibit to the President certificates of regular attendance from their respective Pastors.

The practice of Sacred Music is cultivated regularly in connection with the Chapel Services.
