Kingston, April 3.-(Special.)-The report of W. H. Cross of Toronto, on the inancial condition of the street railway from Jan. 1, 1895, up to the present, was presented to the city council this evening. It showed that the total operating eccipts were \$259,278.90, the total sur-

ing. It showed that the total operating receipts were \$259,278.90, the total surplus being \$7,548.63, but-deducting the interess to bonds, etc., and depreciation of the road, as estimated by capital invested, is \$215,140. In addition to the present bond issue of \$200,000 there are outstanding liabilities of some \$300.0. A sale by the bondholders will be necessary in order to clear up the title. Mr. Cross came out strongly in favor of municipal ownership of the plant as a simple solution of the trouble.
