Montreal, Aug. 26.-(Special.)-Sir Richard Cartwright was perfectly right the other day when he told 'he newspaper correspondents that the Governent could not say if Petersen, Tate & Co. had succeeded or failed in their financial arrangements until the acrival of Baron Strathcona, who has had the matter largely in hand. The fact of the matter is the noble lord left England for the purpose of telling the Canadian Government that, with the reduced subsidy offered by the Laurier Ministry, and provisionally accepted by the Newcastle firm, the necessary financial arrangements cannot be made. It is understood, however, that Petersen, Tate & Co. will make an effort to keep in with the Canadian fast line enterprise, and that Lord Strathcona will lend them a helping hand. A day or two since a gentleman who had been conversing with His Lordship in London reached Montreal, and he gave your correspondent to understand that the scheme was a dead 'failure on the London money market as at first conceived, but he did not say that Petersen, Tate & Co. were altogether out of the race. It appears that the Canadian High Commissioner is coming out to use his influence with the Government to have the same amount given as Sir Charles Tupper was to allow the Allans under the old scheme, and it will not be surprising if Sir Richard is obliged to adopt another plank of the Conservative platform and ask the faithful Commons to sanction the additional vote.
