

Truro, N.S., May 4.—The Truro Condense of Milk and Canning Company's premises were totally destroyed by fire at 5 o'clock tais morning. The buildings were exten-sive, and the output of the factory large, which apparently started near the chimney on the top floor, inspected the buildings at totat night, and says everything was then all right, and is at a loss to know how the fire started. The fire was so fierce that the firemen were compelled to carry barricades in front of them to get near enough to the build-ing to use their hose. The residence of Mr. Thomas, 50 yards away, was also destroyed. A large quantity of goods ready for snip-ment were destroyed. Loss about \$50,000; insurance \$27,000. It is the intention of the company to rebuild at once.
