## A HOT TIME IN THE SENATE

It All Arose Over the Much-Vexed  
Manitoba School Question.

Senator Landry Was Bound to Find Out  
Things and Hon. R. W. Scott Could Not  
Satisfy Him—The Question Was as to  
Whether Mr. Charles Russell Was Act-  
ing for the Catholic Members of the  
Government.

Ottawa, May 4.—In the Upper House to-  
day Senator Landry called attention to a  
letter written by Mr. Charles Russell,  
Solicitor of the Canadian Government in  
London, to Cardinal Rampolla, Secretary of  
State for the Vatican, at the urgent request  
of the Catholic members of the Government  
and Parliament of Canada, to conduct ne-  
gotiations with the Holy See for the settle-  
ment of the Manitoba school question. He  
read the letter, the Senator Landry  
wanted to know once more whether Mr.  
Russell was telling the truth in represent-  
ing that he had gone to Rome at the in-  
stance of the Catholic members of the  
Canadian Government.

The Secretary of State thought Sen-  
ator Landry had exhibited bad taste in bring-  
ing this matter before Parliament. He had  
no knowledge that Mr. Russell had written  
the letter quoted, and he had certainly never  
heard three letters read before. The only  
ever he could give was the one already  
given, that the Government had not at  
any time conducted negotiations with the  
authorities at Rome through Mr. Russell or  
any other person on the school question.  
Senator McMillan said it looked as if the  
Government was trying to beg the ques-  
tion. The information asked for was whether  
Mr. Russell was authorized by the Catholic  
members of the Government to conduct  
negotiations.

Hon. David Mills said the whole question  
was out of order. The Government was not  
responsible for negotiations between indi-  
vidual members of the Administration and  
the head of the church to which they be-  
longed, even supposing the letter quoted  
was authentic, of which fact there was not  
the slightest proof.

Sensor Ferguson said the letter in ques-  
tion bore very strong evidence of being  
authentic.

Hon. David Mills. "The letter is not  
before the House."

Sensor Ferguson: "Not the original, but  
a copy, which is given on the responsi-  
bility of a member of the Senate." What  
the Senate wanted to know was who was  
telling the truth in this matter. The let-  
ter showed that Mr. Russell had on more  
than one occasion conducted negotiations  
on behalf of the Catholic members of the  
Government, with the authorities at Rome.  
Despite this fact, the Minister of Justice  
and the Secretary of State had distinctly  
stated that Mr. Russell had not been au-  
thorized to go to Rome by the Government  
or any of its members. There were cer-  
tainly extraordinary discrepancies between  
the evidence of the letter and the answers  
given to questions by the members of the  
Government in the Senate. It was due to  
the honor of the Senate and the dignity of  
the Government that the Secretary of State  
should make a clean breast of the whole  
matter.

Hon. R. W. Scott at once rose to a point  
of order. He had told all he knew about  
the matter, and he had told the truth. Sen-

ator Ferguson had no right to insinuate  
otherwise.

Sensor Ferguson disavowed any intent to  
insinuate. He was more inclined to infer  
that Mr. Russell had taken unwarrantable  
liberties with the names of the Catholic  
members of the Cabinet.

Hon. R. W. Scott: "I only said that I  
had never before heard of the letter."

Sensor Landry thought it strange that  
the Secretary of State should never  
have heard of the letter, and knew  
nothing about the matter. "I challenge  
the hon. gentleman to say that the letter is  
not genuine."

Hon. R. W. Scott: "I will only say that  
I never saw the letter. I will go no fur-  
ther."

Sensor Landry: "Then I ask the Sec-  
retary of State if he will say that he does  
not know that the Catholic members of the  
Government did authorize Mr. Russell to go  
to Rome for the purpose stated in the let-  
ter."

Hon. R. W. Scott: "I have no further  
answer to make."

The subject then dropped.

Major Uses Double Vote

And Delays Letting Elevator Contract  
By Promise of a Solution

Which Will Please Everybody Concerned  
When Explained on Friday—Fensoms  
Backed by Hubbard and Burns, But  
Major Must Have Respect From Archi-  
tect as to Merits of Oils and Fensoms  
Makes.

The Mayor had to use his double vote  
yesterday afternoon to secure a further ad-  
journment of the Board of Control over the  
elevator question until Friday. But he had  
to promise also that when it was again  
taken up on that day he would suggest  
a solution of the difficulty which he was  
sure would be satisfactory to all concerned.  
Meantime Architect Lennox is to report as  
to the respective merits of the Oils and  
Fensoms elevators.

Corporation Counsel Fullerton's decision  
as to the conformity of Fensoms's specifi-  
cations left it entirely to the option of the  
board as to whether the local company should  
be allowed to withdraw their ex-  
planatory specifications or not. The board  
only intended to qualify the Architect's re-  
ply. But, said he, if the tender had been ac-  
cepted it would have given them an unfair ad-  
vantage.

"Will we allow Fensoms to withdraw?"  
queried Ald. Leslie.

"I say yes," came the Mayor's reply.

Architect Lennox, however, told how the  
Fensoms specifications had been garbled  
such a way as to cheapen the work by  
\$8000 or \$4000. A quibbling tenderer was  
also making a quibbling contractor.

Ald. Leslie imputed to Fensoms the aim  
of having the cheaper specifications slip-  
perily slipped under the Mayor's eye, and  
then binding the Mayor by the latter report  
that he said, "You might as well allow  
the Mayor to come down the same amount  
in their price."

They Let Fensoms Withdraw Them.

Fensoms's withdrawal was then concurred  
in, and the Mayor, with the Architect be-  
hind him, suggested that the latter report  
as to the merits of the two kinds of ele-  
vators, by them at home."

Ald. Burns saw no need of this since  
guarantees were posted.
