The Meaford deputation that left here Mr. Hays of the Grand Trunk in regard by and Toronto returned to this city yesterday morning. The deputation consisted of Mayor J. D. Hamill, ex-Mayor Cameron and J. D. Sing, C.E. They presented the claims of Meaford in councction with the proposed new route, but Mr. Hays gave them to understand that the Grand Trunk was not interested in any project to divert the Northwest traffic from existing routes. The deputation bearned that the Grand Trunk has centred its energies on Midland, which it finds to be the most convenient transfer point for conveying the products of the Northwest to Montreal. Elevators are already established in Meaford, and the Grand Trunk has a short route to Montreal by way of Belleville. The policy of the Grand Trunk will be confined to the development of the traffic along this route. Mr. Hays thought that one great objection to the concentration of the business in Georgian Bay was the existence of so many ports on that bay. In regard to Meaford, Mr. Hays stated that it would be impossible to ship grain via that harbor until the railway had been extended to the water's edge. This would involve the construction of 2½ miles of new track. Mr. Hays promised if the town gave his company the right of way for this track, and also graded it, the Grand Trunk would provide the rails and finish the road. If the town of Meaford wished to go to this expense and also build an elevator the Grand Trunk would be pleased to take charge of wnatewer business offered at that point. It was arranged that Mr. Tiffin, district superintendent at Barrie, and possibly Mr. McGuigan, should visit Meaford at an early date with a view of the company and the low undertaking joint action in the improvement of the trailway and steamboat facilities, The deputation left for home yesterday. Mayor Hamill stated that Meaford would send one or more delegates to the meeting that is soon to be held in Toronto to discuss the new grain route.
