

Serious Trouble Expected at Albany -Marine Engineers Go Back

Washington, May 13 .- Conferences were n progress here to-day between President O'Connell of the International Association of Machinists and President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor and officials of several of the metal working trades other than the machinists, considering the moral and financial support to be given the proposed strike of machinists. At 2.30 o'clock this afternoon President O'Connell said the outlook was very encouraging for a successful strike in many ocalities thruout the country. Mr. O'Connell predicts that a large number of firms the Association of Employers as to a nine-hour day will have signed by May 20. He says the strike will affect at least 100,000 men directly, and over that num ber of allied mechanics indirectly.
