ONE KILLED, THREE HURT IN RIOT AT STOCK YARDS

Mob Menaced Non-Union Men, Who Fired With Fatal Results.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—During a riot in the Stock Yards to-night, one man was shot and killed and three other men were injured by bullets.

The dead and wounded are: Andrew Nebrowski, shot in the centre of the forehead; died immediately.

Harry Hanson, slightly wounded; Dennis Ryan, shot in right side, condition serious; Daniel O'Mara, shot in left leg, not serious.

A crowd of men and women strike sympathizers had gathered at 40th-street and Emerald-avenue, where all trains leaving the Stock Yards stop. A long train filled with Greeks and negroes from the yards stopped and when the strike sympathizers commenced to hoot and jeer at the non-union men and press closer to the side of the cars, the men inside opened fire.

Nebrowski was killed at almost the first shot. Hanson, who was standing close to him, was wounded a second time, and Ryan and O'Mara were hit as the crowd ran away from the cars.

A riot call was turned in and forty policemen hurried to the spot. The police ordered that every door and window of the train be closed, and a party of a dozen men passed thru the train in search of weapons, while the remaining force beat back the crowd.

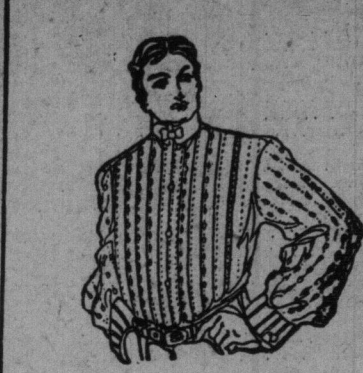

THE TORONTO WORLD

Business Men Inspect Fields Around Brandon and Declare Damage Slight.

Brandon, Aug. 20.—(Special)—A party consisting of S. A. Bedford, superintendent of the experimental farm; John Inglis, president of the board of trade; A. C. Skelton, manager of the Brandon Cattle Co.; and James Henderson of the milling firm of Alexander & Law Bros., and G. W. Marsden, a prominent farmer, drove thru the district north of Brandon, Poplar Hill, Little Saskatchewan Valley, Kenmay and Rosebank, and past South Branch, in west of the city, and closely inspected the crops, taking samples from many fields, about fifty miles.

Also there were indications of rust in some of the later crop, none was in the wheat, but it was not as extensive as in former years.

A large percentage of the crop is already bright golden color, and should ripen in a week or ten days. One lot of samples has been sent to the Winnipeg grain exchange for inspection.

Bedford has lived for years in Manitoba and been in charge of the experimental farm since its foundation.

"I have had opportunities," he says, "of seeing grain in all conditions in this country, and my candid opinion is that the rust this year is not a particle different from other years."

Bedford is an expert, and says this year's rust is something new. While I do not think it is a new disease, I am satisfied in my own mind he is mistaken.

Over at the experimental farm we have some spots of black rust. The grain affected will not yield five bushels to the acre, but the rust there is as different from the rust in the country as day is different from night."

WARS COST 14,000,000 LIVES. Such is Estimate of Prof. Richet, Apostle of Peace in Paris.

Paris, Aug. 21.—Prof. Charles Richet, the noted apostle of peace, is quoted as saying that during the nineteenth century 14,000,000 human beings died in consequence of war.

"I usually credit with having caused the death of 2,000,000 men. As a matter of fact, 8,000,000 men died for his glory. The war of the Crimea cost 200,000 lives, Prussia doomed 800,000 men to death between 1866 and 1871, the Russo-Turkish war cost 1,000,000 lives, and the South American republics are not overburdened with citizens, are the only powers sacrificed during the nineteenth century. In British India, South Africa, Mexico, the Dutch Indies, China, Japan and elsewhere, the estimates amount to 6,000,000 men lost embraced only those who were actually killed in the 'conflict'.
