DESCENDANT OF KING DEAD

Duc de Fitzjames Was Head of Family Founded by James II.

Paris, Oct. 25.—The Duc de Fitzjames, one of the descendants of King James II. of England, died yesterday at Montjustin, near Vesoul, in his 79th year.

He was the head of one of the branches of the house of Berwick, founded by James Fitzjames, Duke of Berwick, the natural son of James II. The duke accompanied King James on his flight from England to France, and settled with the King in this country.

The Berwick family was allied to some of the most illustrious members of the French nobility, and its history has been somewhat checkered. The late duke's father had to fly from France during the revolution, and he entered the service of the House of Hanover against France for a time. But he quarreled with his new friends, and returned to France.

The late duke was married in 1851 to Marguerite de Loewenhielm. He leaves two sons—of whom the elder, the Marquis de Fitzjames, succeeds him—and two daughters.

INCREASE IS NECESSARY

Dairymen Claim They Make Nothing at Present Price of Milk.

The dairymen of this city held a meeting last night in Sherwood Hall to discuss the question of raising the price of milk from 5 cents to 6 cents a quart. Of the hundred odd dealers in London, only about a dozen attended the meeting.

Those who did put in an appearance stated to The Advertiser that the price of feed, especially hay, has reached such a price that in order to make any profit the dairymen must get more for their milk. Hay, Mr. Graydon said, is selling for approximately \$9 per ton, while in this city it is considerably higher.

The milkmen will hold another meeting on Monday at the same place.

FINDS DIME LOST YEARS

Millionaire Returns to Boyhood Home and Recovers the Coin.

Attica, Ind., Oct. 25.—After an absence of sixty-five years, Frank Bookwalter, a millionaire of Springfield, O., has returned to his old home in this county. One of his first acts was to recover a dime he lost when he was five years old, just before he went away.

The dime was given to him by his grandfather, and he was playing with it on the doorstep. He dropped it and it fell into a crack of the stone steps. It was thought it could not be recovered without damaging the steps, and no efforts to get it were made.

The boy's parents were poor when they moved to Ohio. The boy had his own way to make, and he soon developed a love for mechanics. As a young man, he produced some inventions that brought him wealth, and now he is several times a millionaire.

Last week he came back to his boyhood home. His business and his wealth had not made him forget the lost dime and as soon as he got to the old house he offered a man a dollar to get it. A crowbar was brought, the stone steps were lifted from their foundations and the dime was recovered. One side of it was black, but the other was unmarred.

Mr. Bookwalter said that the recovery of that dime gave him as much pleasure as the making of many thousands had done. The house is one of the landmarks of the county. It is stone and was built in 1833.

Owing to the constant noise and splashing the sharks are generally kept at a distance and accidents are rare.

LABOR CONDITIONS GOOD IN LONDON

Head of Ontario Bureau Finds Very Few Men Out of Work Here.

Mr. John Armstrong, secretary of the Ontario Labor Bureau, returned to Toronto yesterday evening after spending two or three days investigating labor conditions in this city.

"I must say," he stated to The Advertiser just before leaving, "that I found the working men busy. So far as I could learn, there are very few skilled or unskilled workers idle—possibly not more than four or five in any one calling."

Mr. Armstrong has only been in harness for the bureau for two or three weeks, having been appointed to succeed Mr. Robert Gloaglin, who resigned because the Whitney Government was not giving the bureau the support he thought it deserved. Mr. Armstrong, however, says he has no fault to find. He announced that branches of the labor bureau were to be established in Hamilton and London about Nov. 1, and also in two cities east of Toronto. The idea of this move is to keep the workers posted on the conditions of the labor market from time to time. By this means, Mr. Armstrong says, they will be able to learn where they can secure employment in the Province, and thus kept from going to the other side.

Mr. Armstrong is an old-time printer, and at 24 years of age was elected president of the International Typographical Union. He is the first Canadian to be elected to that position.

ENGINEER ORDERED TO PREPARE FIGURES FOR SEWER EXTENSIONS

In South London and South-East End of the City—Mayor's Message Criticized.

The board of works, after considering for some time Mayor Judd's message to the council in which sewer extension was recommended, instructed the city engineer to bring in a report at once as to the advisability and cost of the proposed extensions.

Mr. Graydon stated that there are 500 or 600 new houses in the southeast end of the city which are without sewage advantages, and a large portion of South London is in the same fix.

To Aid, Garratt said, that the system was not large enough, and before he voted to spend any money on extensions, he wanted the engineer to state in writing if the system is worthy of being added to.

Mr. Graydon was then ordered to bring in a report as to the advisability and cost of the proposed extensions, and also to state the extensions needed and the cost of the same.

Ald. Garratt referred to one clause of the mayor's message as an insult to the board of works, and his brother suggested agreeing with him the clause was filed.

It was a recommendation to the effect that a more permanent method of repairing roadways be adopted by the city, as the present system of placing gravel on the streets is simply the throwing away of money.

Ald. Wyatt said that it is impossible branches of a modern education. He thought that if these natives were educated they would open the eyes of the world.

Speaking of the South Sea Islands in general, Mr. Bainbridge described the scenery in its irregular features as the most beautiful in the world. He also mentioned that the natives are great lovers of flowers, with which the islands abound.

Among the strange customs of the natives of the Solomon Islands of which Mr. Bainbridge spoke, perhaps the most ridiculous was cannibalism. He said the natives do not eat the bodies of their fellow beings because they have any great liking for human flesh, but because they believe that in eating the body of another man they absorb all his good qualities and thus are greatly improved. For this reason, he said, no chief will eat any man of lower rank than himself, but must have a person of higher rank or a white man. They believe the white men to be exceedingly clever, and therefore are very anxious to get a chance to eat them.

Speaking of the three distinct tribes of Papuans, Mr. Bainbridge spoke at some length on the Black Jews, who were first brought to the attention of the scientific world by Mr. Bainbridge. These people, he said, like the Jews of other countries, live apart from other people, and recognize many of the customs of the ancient Hebrews. Their temples of worship also resemble Jewish synagogues.

A magnificent set of lantern views was used to illustrate the lecture.

A NIGHT WITH THE CANNIBALS

Interesting Lecture on Life and Customs of the South Sea Islanders.

Mr. Oliver Bainbridge, the world-famous traveler and explorer, gave an illustrated lecture at the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium last night on "A Night With Cannibals."

Mr. Bainbridge's lecture lasted about two hours, during which time he gave a splendid description of the life and customs of the natives of the islands of the Southern Pacific Ocean. He dwelt at some length on the conditions as he found them in Fiji, the Solomon Islands and several other portions of what are familiarly known as the South Sea Islands.

In speaking of the Maoris, Mr. Bainbridge gave a brief sketch of their rise from a race of aboriginal cannibals to a condition of cultured civilization, all within one century. These most intelligent of the native tribes, who once took great delight peeling the skin off the feet of any unfortunate foreigner who chanced among them, and then making him walk over broken stones, have now risen to such an advanced state of civilization that some of the members of the New Zealand Parliament are full-blooded Maoris.

Speaking of the wonderful ability of the Maoris, Mr. Bainbridge said that he had over and over again taken advantage of any opportunity to hear the world's best orators, and he could safely say that the best orator he ever listened to was a full-blooded Maori, a member of the New Zealand Parliament.

Mr. Bainbridge spoke in the greatest praise of the splendid work done by the Christian missionaries among the pagan tribes of the South Seas. The results of their work among these people during the last century had been simply marvelous.
