

M.S.A. OFFICER IS SENT FOR TRIAL IN BRIBE CASE

Dominion Force Officer Is Accused of Offering To Get Exemption.

INVOLVED MAGISTRATE

Latter, However, Explains the Circumstances in Police Court Here.

Charged with unlawfully making an order to detain completely the exemption of James and Peter Driver of Palmyra Township, Kent County, from military service, Charles H. Marsh, a Dominion police officer, was committed for trial following a hearing in police court today.

The offer, it was claimed, was made on June 8 in Chatham, to George Driver, high constable of Kent, and the charge was made under section 105 of the amended M. S. A. regulations. The first of its kind to be tried in this district, the case aroused unusual interest, as Marsh is a returned soldier who served three years faithfully in France.

According to the evidence of Peters, Marsh asked him if he wanted to make a bribe of \$200. He told witness that he was an adviser to the two Driver boys, and that there would be \$500 in it, \$100 or \$200 of which he would keep if he would help to keep them from getting to war.

Peters said that Marsh told him that Magistrate Murphy of Ridgeway was going to help him through with it. That Magistrate Murphy would have anything to do with such a transaction was the last thing in the world he would think of, testified the witness, who declared it was beyond all doubt and absolutely impossible.

Peters, further, swore that Marsh asked him to look after the money end of it, when the boys came in to Chatham on Saturday last. The two Drivers had come to his office, and he had reported the case to the military authorities.

James Driver testified that he and his twin brother had reported and sent a few days at Queen's Park, and had returned home on seedling furlough. The other went to Chatham to see Peters.

RECORD INCREASE IN CANADA'S CROP AREA, GOVT. REPORTS SHOW

Potatoes, Wheat, Barley, Oats.

Ottawa, June 12.—An increase of 1,329,595 acres in the amount of land sown in grain and hay in Canada this year, compared with last year, is shown in the first preliminary crop bulletin for the season, issued today by the Dominion Board of Agriculture.

This is an increase of 9 per cent. The returns show very satisfactory increases in the area sown to wheat and oats, and the condition of these crops on May 31 was generally better than at the same date last year.

Great Wheat Acreage.—The total area sown to wheat for the whole of Canada for 1917 is estimated at 16,080,800 acres, as compared with 14,850,000 acres for 1916. The figure for 1917. The area to be harvested of fall wheat is 3,389,000 acres, and of spring wheat is 12,691,800 acres, so that the increase of the latter as compared with 1917 is 1,712,250 acres.

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PRE-REGISTRATION ALREADY STARTED

Commenced Here On Wednesday Afternoon.

MORE WORKERS NEEDED

Volunteers Must Come Forward, Declare the Registrars.

Pre-registration of persons under the manhood and womanhood laws commenced in the factories in London on Wednesday afternoon. Assistant registrars were appointed and sworn in by Registrar R. A. Bayly of the London electoral division at a number of the largest manufacturing plants, and the registration at these places is now proceeding without delay.

Commencing on Saturday, or not later than Monday next, places in the registration of any person over 16 years of age will be opened in various sections of the city. Registrars Bayly and Fitzgerald are instructed to proceed with pre-registration as soon as they receive the cards.

The same arrangements made by Registrar Bayly, with respect to the registration of persons unable to appear in person, will be adopted by Registrar Fitzgerald.
