

## Wide Easily Defeats Zulu Kid on Points

With the Exception of 7th, 8th and 9th Rounds the Fight Was All in the Englishman's Favor.

The American Took the Count of Eight in Second Round On Receiving a Smashing Left On Point of Jaw.

WINDSOR, April 12.—Jimmy Wilde, the Britisher failed to make them the American was the first to enter the ring. He got a good hand as he stepped through the ropes. **FIFTH ROUND**—Both exchanged heavy blows during this period, Wilde getting in a terrific left that was unseen by the spectators, so swiftly that the Kid finished the round on the ropes, taking whatever Wilde wished to dish up.

**SIXTH ROUND**—Wide varied the attack in this period and fought with his hands at his hips and wide open. The Kid during this round was slow with all attempts at blows.

**SEVENTH ROUND**—Wide came in for a battering for a number of uppercuts, but came back with a strong left-hook, which looked like a sleep inducer. The Kid came back strong, and got the best of the exchange at close quarters. Wilde started in to give the second a real scrap and waded right in, instead of taking advantage of his reach. He had the Zulu Kid bad, but the Kid stuck it through.



## CALGARY EARL DUE FOR BIG SEASON ON GRAND CIRCUIT

Experts Figure Canadian Horse Will Produce History This Year.

Tom Gahagan says: Canada, which has contributed to harness horse history some of the greatest of stake pacers, furnishes another candidate for honors among the side-wheel brigade this season in the chestnut horse Calgary Earl, 2:02 1/2, bred up in the Manitoba country, but recently purchased by an Illinois horseman and now being prepared at the Indianapolis track for a trip through the Grand Circuit. The stallion was a good winner in the west last year. His first win was at the Lexington meeting last fall that he showed the form which made him look to be a candidate for championship honors and caused his sale to his present owner for a long price.

White Calgary Earl was raised and trained last season by the Canadian driver Jack Keenan, who was the Hoosier reinsman Sep Paine who was behind him at Lexington when he showed a couple of miles better than 2:02 in a race in which he was a contender but did not win. That he didn't top the summary was lucky for his owner for he would have taken a record which would have condemned him to the free-for-all class in which the chances of earning big money are not the brightest. Earl was raised in the stable of the near-Arctic regions last but given serious consideration.

Paine purchased Calgary Earl for Robert Burgess, a resident of Illinois, who for years has been famous as an importer of heavy-draft horses, but of late has been investing in harness racing. He has a brilliant light harness horse bred. It was for him that Paine raced the chestnut-faced pacer near Eva Abbe last season, a mare which won on the Grand Circuit and a stake race in the west, and a heat in 2:03 from the season's leading stake winner, Direct C. Burnett, 2:01 1/2. It was in this race that the last named pacer that Calgary Earl showed so well at Lexington.

If Calgary Earl turns out to be any where near as good a racehorse as his sire he will prove a very valuable investment for his present owner. He is a son of that old grey warrior Earl Dun, 2:01 1/2, prominent on the Grand Circuit a decade ago and which was still racing last season, taking in the free-for-all class on the Grand Circuit, and was compared to the best of the Indiana stables, Single G, which has it on the ground, and a considerable way in speed, but still has a considerable way to go in point of continuous service.

Earl Jun, raced as a 3-year-old in the west, and the following season was purchased by Walter Cox, the York race owner, who has a half dozen different trainers, for all of whom he raced well, and the one who he has had since he was left under his belt yet. In spite of his 15 years of age and twelve seasons on the turf, he is owned at one time in Calgary, where he sired Calgary Earl.

If Calgary Earl makes good he will be but one of many pacers coming from Canada and winning fame on this side of the border. The Dominion has not been noted for the production of great trotters, but in the pacing line it holds up its end nobly. Among the noted side-wheelers which have been owned or bred there may be mentioned Frank Bosch Jun, 1:59 1/2, which won the \$5,000 Chamber of Commerce Stake race at Detroit in 1913 and also took his fastest mile ever negotiated there; Angus Pointer, 2:01 1/2, a free-for-all race mare that a dozen years ago; Joe Patchen II, 2:03 1/2, which won the 1912 Chamber of Commerce and last but not one race on the Grand Circuit; Vernon McKinney, 2:02 1/2, another Chamber of Commerce Stake winner; The Ed, 2:02 1/2, one of the greatest racing pacers which ever looked through a handle; Louis Gratton, 2:02 1/2, a 1913 star; Merry Widow, 2:03 1/2, and many others. It is a peculiar fact that practically all of these stars were raced both on this side of the border and started their campaigns on the dirt tracks west of the Mississippi. Many of the trainers on this side of the border think that a three-month racing season is plenty long enough, yet there are several of the pacers mentioned above which have had long training and racing, summer or winter.

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
