John Redmond Says That It is Other Evidence in Favor of Home Rule.

London, March 6.-Premier Balfou announced in the house of commons to-day that Mr. Wyndham, the chief metary of Ireland, had resigned. The premier said he had been unable iny longer to withstand the appeals of Mr. Wyndham to be allowed to resign.
Mr. Wyndham did not believe that he would be able at the present time to support all the labors and anxieties of his great office, but his principal reason for resigning was the fact that the recent controversy inside and outside the house had greatly impaired, if not altogether destroyed, the value of the work he could perform as chief secretary for Ireland.

Mr. Balfour added that he did not propose to enter into the merits of the controversy, altho there were features of it on which he had very strong opinions. Mr. Wyndham alone was the judge as to the effect it had on h s usefulness. The premier regretted that Mr. Wyndham was not present to explain his position personally in accordance with custom, but Mr. Balfour hoped he might soon be in a position to do so.

The Ulster Unionists do not discusse. Mr. Wyndham to be allowed to resign,

The Ulster Unionists do not disguise their joy at the success of the manoeuvres to oust Mr. Wyndham, but their happiness they openly assert will not be complete unless Sir Anthony P. MacDonnell, under secretary to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, joins his late chief in retirement.

The defection of the Irish Unionists was undoubtedly the cause of Mr. Wyndham's resignation and Mr. Balfour's acceptance thereof, the split in the ministerial ranks being such as to threaten the extinction of the government's majority at any moment. Walter Long, president of the local government board is regarded as the probable successor of Mr. Wyndham.

John Redmond, chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, in an interview to day, said that Mr. Wyndham's resignation was another evidence in favor of home rule and a distinct step in that direction. The government has tried the best men in Ireland, he said. If control of that country from Downing-street were possible, someone would have succeeded in adjusting affairs to the general satisfaction. Mr. Wyndham was one of the government's star men, and did his best, but finding that he could accomplish nothing towards reform of the present Irish administration, he began to favor home rule. This attitude met with the disapproval of the Ulster men. When taken to task in the house, Mr. Wyndham made the fatal mistake of rounding on his "pal," which was unpardonable.
