DERNBURG RAISED VOICE IN PROTEST

"Absolutely False," He Says of Statement of German Position

PHILADELPHIA, May 1.—Dr. Bernhard Dernburg, former colonial secretary of Germany, raised his voice in protest at today's session of the annual meeting of the American Academy of Political and Social Science against a declaration said to have been made at last night's meeting of the academy that Germany had protested against the right of the United States to sell and distribute arms to belligerent countries. Dr. Dernburg came here as a listener to discussions on the effect of the European war on America's interests, and at the close of today's session made a brief speech, in which he said the declaration made last night was "absolutely false."

Dr. Dernburg went on to explain that Germany had only complained of the inequality of treatment that his country is receiving, in that foodstuffs are shut out of Germany, whereas there is a free transit of arms to Great Britain.

The former colonial secretary, speaking on permanent peace, said he favored any scheme or act of compulsory arbitration, whereby nations thru economic pressure, would be compelled to arbitrate their differences before going to war.

SIX MORE SHELLS FELL IN DUNKIRK

Considerable Damage Done to Town During Friday Night's Bombardment

FOLKESTONE ENG., May 1, 5-27 P.M.—Refugees arriving here from Dunkirk, France, report that six shells from the German 17-inch guns fell in Dunkirk Friday evening at intervals of ten minutes. Considerable damage was done to the town. The women and children of Dunkirk are leaving in large numbers.

This is the second bombardment of this port, the first being reported as having occurred on Thursday.

Big Guns Again.

It would appear from this despatch that the Germans are using their famous 42-centimetre guns, the artillery which attracted so much attention at the beginning of the war, in the bombardment of Dunkirk. Forty-two centimetres is equal to 16.5 inches and a shell of this size might easily be counted as a 17-inch shell by the people of Dunkirk.

GERMANS CLAIM ADVANCE IN EAST

Troops Said to Be Already Over Seventy Miles From Memel

NEAR KORNA AND VILNA

Will Attempt to Cut Russian Line of Communication

BERLIN, May 1.—By wireless to Sayville—The German advance in the northeast is being hailed generally with expressions of satisfaction and surprise. Nothing was known of the movement, altho judging by the fact, that the troops are already over 70 miles from Memel, the march must have been begun some days ago. Local military experts point out that Szawie, where the fighting is proceeding, is to the east of line between Kovno and Vilna, two points indispensable to the protection of the Vistula and Warsaw.

The fact that the troops had advanced so far without being discovered is commented upon, as an indication that the scouting service of the Russians is no better today than it was during the Russo-Japan war. It is declared here that the Russian commander faces the possibility of the cutting of his lines of communication unless he abandons his forces and the line of the river, or throws the invaders back.

There is a town called Shavilb in the centre of the Russian province of Kovno. It is on the railroad between Libau and Duffaburg, which the German report yesterday said had been reached by the invading forces. Shavilb is about 60 miles from the frontier of East Prussia and about 30 miles from Memel. The Spelling Szawie probably is the German rendering of Shavilb.

SAVED QUEEN EMPRESS FROM RUNAWAY

Rescuer of Queen Victoria and Empress Eugenie Died in Toronto

JAMES WIGGLESWORTH

Received Many Decorations for Heroic Conduct—Was in Fenian Raid

In the death of James W. Wigglesworth, who today was buried in Saint Michael's Cemetery, one of the world's heroes has passed to his reward. Born in the Village of Birkley, near Huddersfield, Yorkshire, England, on Nov. 2, 1840, he, on reaching his 16th year, ran away from home and enlisted in the 16th Infantry Regiment. A few months afterwards his regiment was sent to India, and during the American Civil War in 1864, his regiment was sent to Canada on special service. He gradually arose from the ranks, and on the arrival of his corps in Toronto he held the rank of color sergeant.

Receives From Ranks.

His regiment was first quartered in the old parliament buildings on Front street, and later in the old buildings used by the James Robertson Saw Works, on West Queen street, near John street.

While at Huddersfield, England, doing guard duty, one day Mr. Wigglesworth had the distinguished honor of saving the lives of our late lamented and gracious sovereign, Queen Victoria and Her Majesty the Empress Eugenie of France, whose horses, attached to the royal carriage, had run away, throwing their driver and footmen from the carriage. He was personally decorated by Her Majesty for his heroism on this occasion. He also received the Fenian Raid medal, with two bars, for his services during this campaign. He then purchased his discharge from the service and opened a large grocery and provision store at the corner of Edward and Yonge streets, which he conducted for several years. Selling out he entered the service of the Great Western Railway, at the foot of Yonge street, and continued in their service until they amalgamated with the G.T.R., when he was appointed their Esplanade checker, which position he held for nineteen years. Latterly he held the position of night clerk at the Royal Hotel at Guelph for about five years.

Mr. Wigglesworth is survived by his only son, James C. Wigglesworth, the bookbinder, in the employ of the T. Eaton Company, Toronto.
