Early in the course of his musical education, Mr. Fisher's attention was attracted towards the diversified and conflicting systems of instruction adopted in various

Conservatories of Music. So deeply was he interested in what he observed of these institutions, especially while pursuing his own musical studies at Boston and Berlin, that he determined to thoroughly investigate the most important methods in use, and ascertain, as far as possible, their real value and practical effect on the art of music from an educational standpoint. His residence in Berlin and subsequent visits to other European cities afforded him opportunities for acquiring information of the most comprehensive character concerning the best music schools and systems of musical instruction.

After returning from Europe, he occupied at different times the position of Musical Director in several of the leading educational institutions of Canada; has held the post of organist

and choir-master of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, since 1879, and was for some twelve years conductor of the Toronto Choral Society, a position which the continued growth of the Conservatory made it necessary for him to resign in 1891. His specialty in the musical profession is pre-eminently that of a teacher, having made the art and science of teaching, especially in its relation to the pianoforte, a constant study for many years. The large number of his pupils throughout Canada, who, besides being artistic and brilliant performers, are now filling important positions as piano teachers and organists, attest the thoroughness of his methods and his skill as a musical educator.

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
