GOOD WORK
BEING DONE

In Spite of the Scarcity of La-
bor Good Progress is Being
Made on This Section of the
G. T. P.

Work on the New Brunswick section
of the Transcontinental railway goes
on apace. The contract has just been award-
ed J. W. McManus & Co. of Moncton, for
that portion west of Moncton from the
fiftieth to the fifty-eighth mile, which
will extend a short distance across the Sal-
mon river.

In conversation with a Times reporter
this morning Guy C. Dunn said that the
McManus people expect to get men on
the ground at once. The building of a
bridge over the Salmon river is included
in this contract. Work on the bridge will
be proceeded with this fall. Mr. Dunn
says this section is fairly heavy and
consequently difficult for construction
work. Men are not any too plentiful and
this naturally retards the work some-
what. However, there are from three to
four hundred laborers at work besides
eighty or ninety of the engineering staff.
This latter includes four location parties,
who are at work at the final location
between Chipman and Grand Falls. A
month ought to see the line located there.
Mr. Dunn believes.

The year in the woods has been a bad
one Mr. Dunn says, on account of the
great quantity of rain. A heavy shower
in the morning necessitates a suspension
of work all day as the bush becomes
thoroughly soaked.

The Grand Falls to Quebec boundary

MAY RESULT
FATALLY

One Man Reported Dying From
Wounds Received in Shooting
Affray on Shore Line.

A serious shooting affray occurred yester-
day afternoon at Prince of Wales settle-
ment among a number of Italian na-
tives working for the New Brunswick
Southern Railway, and as a result An-
tonio Codispati is reported dying from loss
of blood caused by a bullet wound in his
breast. Antonio Saichutani said to be an-
other of the combatants, received two
charges of duck shot in the upper part of
his body, but his condition is not regarded
as dangerous. A third man was shot
over the right eye.

The injured men, who are lying in the
cars in which they lived, near Nigger
Brook, Prince of Wales settlement, were
attended to by Dr. G. G. Roberts and
M. L. Macfarland. A revolver and a cap,
identified as the property of Codispati,
were found near the scene of the shooting.
The gang numbered about forty-five,
and half of the number, terrified through
fear of being arrested, fled and are scat-
tered between Prince of Wales and Le-
preux. Up to this morning no arrests
had been made, and it had been arranged
that the injured men be brought to the
city on a ballast train and removed to the
hospital.

The Italians who have been at work
about a month, have been ballasting the
road-bed, and, as already stated, lived in
three cars, standing on a siding near Nig-
ger Brook.

It is stated that the men were drinking
freely, having obtained their liquor from a
car at which they purchased supplies. Con-
siderable rioting and shouting was heard
during the morning, but no shooting oc-
curred until between two and three o'clock
in the afternoon.

Present information is to the effect that
the trouble arose over a roll of bills
thrown from a car window and picked up
by some three or four Italians who were
near.
