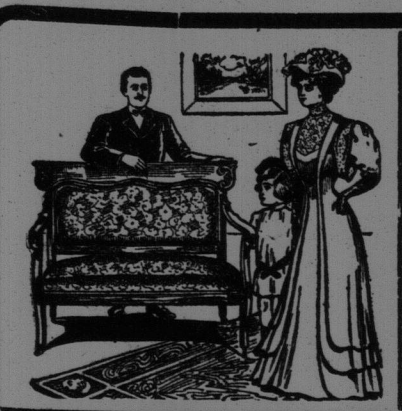


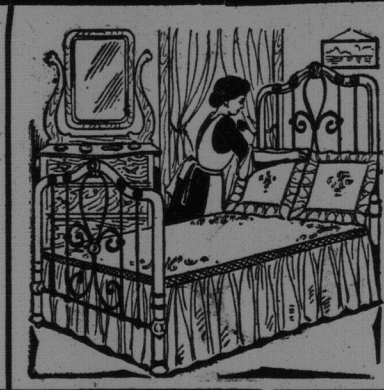
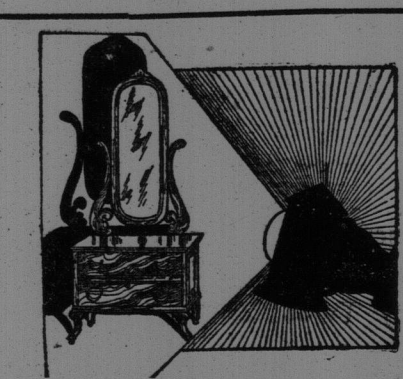

UNBROKEN COLT \$8000.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—The Walnut Hall farm consignment brought out spirited bidding today at the Pae-Tipton Company's mid-winter sale of trotting stock in Madison Square Garden. Fair prices were realized for most of the consignment.

Interest centred in The Harvester, a 3-year-old brown trotting colt by Walnut Hall-Notetale. The Harvester was a fine looking animal and the bids were raised by leaps and bounds until he finally was knocked down for \$8,000 to A. Uihlein, a Milwaukee breeder.

The \$8,000 which Mr. Uihlein paid for The Harvester is one of the largest amounts ever given for an unbroken colt. Several others were anxious to get the prize, but most of them had dropped out of the bidding when George B. Sherman of Port Henry offered \$7,000. This was followed by a bid of \$8,500 from James W. Daly of Mt. Kisco. Mr. Uihlein's increase of \$300 brought down the auctioneer's hammer.

The Walnut Hall consignment of 64 horses, mostly unbroken 2-year-olds brought the fine figure of \$27,125, an average of \$424.

#### THE MEET AT MONTREAL TODAY

Montreal, Jan. 31.—All the best amateurs of the United States and Canada will compete in the international skating championships here tomorrow.

There are more than seventy entries, and while the favorites are Logan, of St. John; Ahlroth, of Duluth; Anderson, of Chicago; Lamy, of Saranac Lake; Robson, of Toronto, dark horses may carry off some of the big events.

Logan is the favorite for the 220 and half mile, although Ahlroth beat him at the latter distance Wednesday at Saranac Lake. Logan lost because he and Lamy, jockeying each other at the start, let the westerner get a big lead, but at that Logan was a close second.

In the 220 Robson will be a dangerous competitor, but Logan beat him twice this week at the distance.

It is not expected that any one skater will make a sweep of the speed events.

He suffered a severe nervous shock, however, and will be confined to his bed for some time.
