**First Man of 26th To Be Killed**

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—The casualty list issued midnight reveals the hero of the gallant exploit of the 26th Battalion who, it may fairly be expected, will be recommended for honors for braving in a wounded man under heavy fire. His name is Sergeant William C. Rye, of Middle Clyde (N. S.). His name appears among the slightly wounded and he is again back on duty.

At the time Rye left St. John he was a lance-corporal but he has proved himself worthy of the promotion he has received. He is 28 years of age and single. His next of kin is his mother, Mrs. Sarah Rye, Middle Clyde (N. S.). He had no military experience when he enlisted.

The first mortality in the 26th also appears in the list. Moses Gallant, of Charlottetown (P. E. I.), is reported killed in action. He was 26 years of age, single, and his next of kin is Miss K. Quinn, 138 Elm avenue, Charlottetown (P. E. I.).

John W. Roberts, Chipman (N. B.), is among the slightly wounded in the battalion. He is 36 years of age. He was a member of the 3rd Battalion, R. C. R. for some time. His wife lives in Chipman.

Joseph Crouse, of North Brookfield, Queens county (N. S.), 4th Battalion, died of wounds.

The British official statement issued with regard to last Wednesday's Zepplin raid gave the military casualties at fourteen killed and fifteen wounded. With the announcement of the death by bombs from a Zepplin of Gunner Charles G. Peterkin, of the 29th Battery, C. F. A. In the midnight casualty list, the total number of Canadians killed in the air raid has reached fourteen, indicating that the only military losses occurred among the Canadians.

An Appeal From Sister of a Man in Khaki

THEY WANT GOOD INFLUENCES

St. John Writer Supports Strong Plea Made by a Clergyman Through a Halifax Newspaper—Easy and Profitable

St. John, N. B., Oct. 14, 1915.

To the Editor of the Times:  
Sir—I have had in mind for some time the idea of using your columns as a medium for impressing upon the women of St. John the very thing the enclosed clipping from a Halifax paper so splendidly put into words.

You will notice that the writer is a minister of the gospel, who left wife and home to enlist only to find himself a social outcast in the strange city. Surely these suggestions, coming as they do from one who knows, are most timely.

There were many lonely ones in the battalion quartered here last winter (men whose life blood ebbs freely in the trenches of Belgium today) that you and I may still enjoy, undisturbed the comforts of home and family, there will be many more such in the near future.

Christian women of St. John, what can we do along this line to make the other woman's son, husband or brother feel at home in our city?

Trusting you will publish this, and thanking you for space, I remain, sir, THE SISTER OF THE MAN IN KHAKI.

The Halifax Appeal

To the Citizens of Halifax:

I realize that the people of Halifax have done much for the soldiers of different units which have made a stay in the city on their way to the European battlefields. One thing is, however, distinctly lacking. Permit me to point it out. I have pleasure in doing this, especially as I have confidence that the Christian citizens of Halifax would supply the one thing lacking if more of them realized it.

The fact is that only about a dozen men of the elite artillery in South Barracks have seen the inside of a private home since they came to this city en route to be the actual saviors of our great empire. This means that their evenings, half-holidays and hours off-duty have been spent in the street, in the Y. M. C. A. theatres, ice cream parlors, or liquor saloons.

Barrack-room life at best lacks the humanizing and social influence of the home. These men have left wife, sister, mother and sweetheart, and are separated now from the uplifting influence of the women, except for casual acquaintances picked up in the street, in the saloon, theatre or store.

What the inside lining of their hearts is craving for is the company of good women and an occasional evening spent in the humanizing, cheery, breezy and healthful influence of a private home.

I appeal to the Christian men and women of this city. Throw open your doors once or twice a week. Put another leaf in your dinner table some evening and on Sundays. Permit me as an ordained minister of the gospel to say that a woman who concentrated Sunday morning to the task of making a homelike, just-as-mother-makes-it dinner for a few khaki boys would be working for her Christ even more truly than her ceremonial, punctilious would-be Christians. Invite the soldiers to your homes.

I have met plenty of people who would rather give an extra dollar to the patriotic fund than make a few soldiers feel at home before the open grate of their own heart and home. I want to say that those people are not worth fighting for, but I am contented to imagine that they are greatly in the minority. The civilian who isn't doing both these things isn't doing his part.

Imagine one of my readers asking how he could meet the soldiers and what opportunity would he have to invite them. Let me reply that every day numbers of our soldiers visit the splendid Y. M. C. A. of this city. There is a great opportunity to meet our soldiers in this magnificent building in Barrington street. That is one place and opportunity. I appeal to you men in business in this city, go there, get in touch with them and invite them to your homes.

In the Siege Artillery in South Barracks are men who have come from almost every walk and profession in life. Let me say to the civilians of Halifax that you could find your equal and your companion in almost any trade or profession among our volunteers for overseas active service.

Again we have paraded to several different churches since we came to the city. There are many ways by which the church people might meet with the soldiers and invite them to their homes. Some men will read this and say to themselves, "I have no social talent and I couldn't entertain them." If this is true, you probably chose a life companion brimful of cheer and entertainment, and if your wife has it, probably your daughters are very sociable and have this talent like a multiplication table. Your wife would likely be a mother to any other mother's boy if you gave her the opportunity. I appeal to you to try it.

LOCAL BRANCH VOTES \$1,000 FOR BRITISH RED CROSS

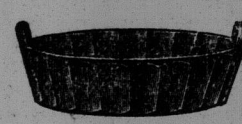
