BERLIN, Dec. 17.—The government of Chancellor Marx today resigned after being defeated in the Reichstag 249 to 171, on a vote of non-confidence. The cabinet, which was automatically ousted by the adverse vote, will tender its formal resignation to President Von Hindenburg some time this evening.


