Large forces of men were called out to battle with the flames while some stood to at hydrants in the town all night in case the fire should invade the residential section.

Yesterday the wind fell and the fire was brought under control, but the timber was very dry and serious fires are raging further back from the town. Fires are also reported in the Elk River Basin.

\$15,000 GEMS ARE TAKEN AS WOMAN DINES

Burglars Loot Apartment

While Mrs. Rolles is Hostess in a Restaurant.

New York, Oct. 3.—While Mrs. Thomas G. Rolles of 306 West Seventy-third street, was hostess at a dinner party to two couples from the south at the Colony Restaurant, Sixty-first street and Madison avenue, Wednesday evening about 9 o'clock, and her companion, a Miss Goodwin, was having her evening meal at the Hotel George Washington, on West Seventy-second street, two burglars entered the apartment and stole a large quantity of jewelry belonging to Mrs. Rolles. Report had it that the value of the jewelry was \$75,000, but Mrs. Rolles last night placed the value of the stolen property at \$15,000. The police, she said, had assured her they were close on the trail of the robbers and hoped to make an important arrest within a few days.

Miss Goodwin returned while the burglars were still in the apartment, and was roughly handled by them. They dashed out just as Miss Goodwin got to the Bolles apartment on the second floor. One slipped her on the side of the face and the other bowled her over, and she landed on the next turn of the stairs five or six feet. Although bruised about the face and legs, Miss Goodwin sprang up and ran after the burglars. Her screams were heard by the occupants of the house next door at 308 West seventy-third street, and they got out to the front stoop in time to see two men running away. Miss Goodwin has since been under the care of a physician at the home of a friend. An examination of the apartment showed that the burglars had removed a door, frame and all, in the rear of the apartment. The door itself could not well have been "jimmied," as it was protected with a patent lock and had strong hinges. Jewelry was found in drawers and other places in the apartment. Mrs. Rolles said she had furnished the police a detailed description of the missing jewelry. The police also have a fairly good description of the robbers.

The house is an old-fashioned private dwelling and is being remodeled into apartments. The front is entirely open. The ground floor and the first floor are occupied while the renovation is in progress. Last night two watchmen were on duty.

Mrs. Rolles said that her husband was in Atlanta, Ga., and since he has been Miss Goodwin had been staying with her. Wednesday evening, Mrs. Rolles had as her guests Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Jones of Brownsville, Texas, and Mr. and Mrs. John Warren of Atlanta, Ga., at the Colony Restaurant. They stopped en route to leave Miss Goodwin at the George Washington, where she usually takes her dinner. Miss Goodwin returned home about 9:30 o'clock. Immediately after the discovery of the burglary Mrs. Rolles was notified by Detectives Kierman and Connors of the West Sixty-eighth street station. With her guests she hurried home.

Mrs. Rolles had lived in the apartment for the last four years. She is a native of Tampico, Mexico.

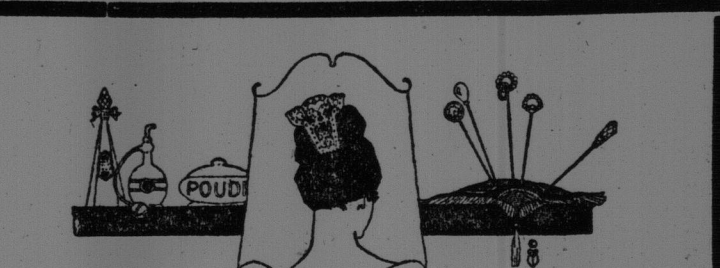

NO RENT OR TAXES PAID FOR YEARS

London, Oct. 3.—(By Canadian Press).—The City of Hull, Yorkshire, has a unique class of tenants—those who pay neither rent nor taxes. In a working-class neighborhood in that city there are sixteen houses and one shop for which the occupants have not paid any rent or taxes for many years. This statement is given on the authority of the Hull correspondent of the London Daily News, who adds that the authorities on property law say that they have never heard of a similar case.

A conscientious tenant in the group became tired of waiting for the landlord's agent to call for the rent, and went to the agent's office about the matter. "Go away," said the agent. "Don't bother me about rent; when I want it I will call for it."

That was three years ago. Since then none of the tenants in question have seen the landlord, nor has any one of them been asked to pay the rates. The Hull authorities recently insisted on repairs to the houses being affected, but the occupants were not asked to pay for the work.

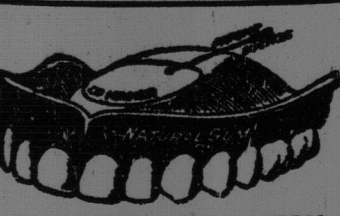
