### SAVES MATE HELD HIM; CAPTAIN PUNCHED HIM

#### Sailor on Steamship at Boston Charges Assault on High Seas.

Boston, Feb. 4.—How discipline was maintained on a deep sea ship was described yesterday in the federal court. Christian O. Karlson, in support of his charge that Captain John McPhee of the steamer Winnebago was guilty of assault on the high seas during a voyage from Cuba that ended here on Wednesday, said the skipper put him in irons and had the mate hold him while he punched his face and pulled his hair. Henri Johansson, another seaman, corroborated the charge.

From Karlson's story it appeared that the captain, searching the forecastle for liquor, found the word "starvation" written in chalk on the deck, and ordered Karlson to wash off the word. But Johansson said it was he who had written it and he would erase it. The captain insisted that Karlson do the cleaning as ordered, Karlson refused.

Under cross-examination Karlson admitted he had threatened to use a knife if the mate did not let go his hands while the captain was striking him. The captain's side of the story will be heard today.

### HALIFAX OBSERVANCE OF ANNIVERSARY OF SIR WALTER SCOTT.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 4.—Pitting celebration, in August, 1921, of the 150th anniversary of the birth of Sir Walter Scott, Scottish literary hero, is planned by the North British Society of Halifax. A committee has been named to formulate a programme worthy of the occasion.

## SOUTH END BOYS' CLUB IS OFF TO A FINE START

### The South End Boys' Club opened last evening under the most auspicious conditions.

Frank White, president of the South End Improvement League, occupied the chair and Miss Tyner was at the piano. The meeting opened with the singing of the national anthem.

Mr. White welcomed the several hundred citizens present in a short address and appealed to them to come to the aid of the new club. He also expressed thanks to all those whose kindness had rendered the purchase of equipment for the club possible.

A. M. Belding spoke, explaining the aims and purposes of the Boys' Club and referred to the fact that the club was organized three years ago and now had a fine playground, an open-air skating rink and a boys' club room. Referring to the splendid organization of the East End and North End Improvement Leagues, he expressed a hope that, in a short time, there might be four such organizations, one in each section of the city. He paid tribute to the city council's assistance in the work and also appealed to the people of the south end to support this club which, he said, had great possibilities to benefit the boys of that section.

Mr. Belding paid a tribute to Rev. H. A. Cody, C. M. Lingley, Thos. Killen, A. H. Ellis, Alex. Wilson, G. N. Hatfield, R. E. Armstrong, W. K. Haley and others who had been faithful to the South End Improvement League, and referred especially in connection with the Boys' Club to the splendid work of James H. Hamilton.

Commissioner Frink, who was the next speaker, presented to representatives of the Nashua baseball team, of the Industrial League, the large cup, donated by Spaulding & Co. through their agents, W. H. Thorne & Co., Ltd. The commissioner complimented the South End on the work accomplished and mentioned that the name of that club brought to mind one of the great lumber kings of New Brunswick—Alexander Gibson, of Nashua river. He referred to his life as an example of what a poor boy could do.

Commissioner Thornton presented the cup won by the Wolves, of the North End League. He also said that he would be glad at any time to help the South End League.

Commissioner Jones made a short address and presented to the Pirates, winners of the South End League, the cup which had been donated to the club by the city. He referred to his early efforts as a commissioner to have a volunteer made around the exhibition building, a plan which had to be abandoned owing to lack of funds. He also reminded the meeting that the street on which the club was located no longer was Sheffield street but had been renamed several years ago and now was Broadview avenue.

C. M. Lingley presented pins to the members of the baseball team which had won the junior league in the South End. He complimented the boys on the gentlemanly manner in which they had accepted defeat several times during the summer.

David Ramsay, president of the East End Improvement League, conveyed greetings and congratulations to the South End club. He gave an interesting account of the work which was being done in their section and said that the East End League was looking for a

building similar to that which the South End now had for the benefit of the boys of their section.

Captain Mulcahy brought greetings from the West End and said that he regretted that more progress had not been made over there. He congratulated the East and South ends on their great success and said he hoped to see a revival of the same spirit in his section of the city.

A large delegation from the Rotary Club, led by DeWitt Cairns, sang several choruses. Norman Magnusson contributed a recitation and a vocal solo and DeWitt Cairns was heard in vocal solos.
