FOOTBALL.

That Matter of Amateurs.

Winnipeg, May 10.—The ruling of Secretary Crowe of the A. A. U. of C. in regard to amateur footballers playing against the visiting Scottish professionals is held to be premature and unjustifiable by local officials of the Dominion Football Association. The football officials declare that at an informal meeting held during the annual convention of the athletic union here last fall, President Dan MacNeil and Secretary Roy of the football association, received a verbal decision from Judge Jackson of Lethbridge, vice-president of the A. A. U. in the presence of a committee of the A. A. U. convened on football matters, to the effect that, as the Scottish visit was purely of a missionary character, no action would be taken against players chosen to perform against the professionals. Secretary Crowe's ruling is considered by football officials here as tantamount to a declaration of forfeiture of the amateur status of players so chosen.

Secretary Roy will make further overtures to the amateur officials. Whatever the ruling, he says, the tour will go on. Yesterday it was reported that Halifax would not be able to offer the visitors a game if the local players had to sacrifice their amateur standing.

\$406,000.000 SPENT IN PAST FISCAL YEAR

Ottawa, Ont., May 10.—The financial statement will show that the total expenditures of the dominion in the fiscal year ended March 31st last, amounted to some \$406,000,000, of which \$198,115,579 was for interest on the public debt and \$48,816,000 on capital account for war, railways and canal and public works. The revenue totalled more than \$130,000,000, of which \$102,900,000 was derived from customs duties. Main excises provide for an expenditure of \$613,000,000, of which interest in the public debt is sinking fund provision accounts for \$143,000,000 and \$268,000,000 for the requirements of the Canadian National and Grand Trunk Railways.
