FOUR KIDDIES DIE IN BRONX TENEMENT FIRE

Parents Make Frantic Efforts to Save Them, But to No Avail.

New York, Aug. 5.—Four children were burned to death and seven others seriously injured in an early morning fire which swept three tenement houses in the Bronx this morning.

The dead were all children of Julio Corinne, who lived on the top floor of the tenement, in which the fire started. Corinne escaped. Seven other residents of the block suffered severe burns.

The fire spread quickly from the tenement in which it started to the adjoining tenements and when flames reached the scene they found more than a score of panic-stricken women and children crowded before the windows crying for aid.

Twenty persons were rescued by means of ladders from the central one of the three buildings.

The four Corinne children who lost their lives were caught in their bedroom by falling roof timbers while their parents made frantic efforts to reach them. Corinne, his wife and two other children were carried down the ladders to safety.

EXHUME BODIES; POLICE SUSPECT SERIES OF MURDERS

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Two more bodies are to be exhumed in the investigation of the deaths of the Koles family in an effort to trace down what county officials assert may be a series of murders.

Coroner Hoffman ordered exhumation of Mrs. Lena Koles. If her body shows traces of arsenic, as did those of John and Fred Koles and a fifth body, Demmer, whose widow, Mrs. Mary Demmer, has been questioned, the coroner said he would examine a fifth body not related to the Koles family, but embalmed by the same undertaker. The undertakers assert their embalming fluid does not contain arsenic.

Mrs. Mary Demmer, housekeeper of Fred Koles after the deaths here of her husband and Mrs. Koles is being detained. John Demmer died about nine years ago and Mrs. Koles died nine months later. Mrs. Demmer then became housekeeper for Fred Koles, whose death occurred several weeks ago.

Among them was one from Queen Mother Alexandra of England, which reads:

"It is with deep regret that I hear of the death of your gifted husband whose wonderful voice has for so long delighted the world. His loss will be much felt in England, and I offer you my sincere sympathy in your great bereavement."

ULSTER CABINET MEETING AGAIN

Believed De Valera and His Advisers Favor London Conference.

London, Aug. 5.—Another meeting of the Ulster cabinet has been called to discuss the Irish peace negotiations, so it was announced today, although it is reiterated in Belfast that no message has been received there from Eamon De Valera. It is added that no overtures will be entertained which diminish the powers of the northern parliament. None the less, the imperial government continues optimistic as to the outcome of the talks and the opposing leaders together.

While the Sinn Fein leaders are maintaining silence, it is believed Mr. De Valera and his advisers favor a conference in London and will support, before the republican parliament, a proposal for such a conference.

It is hoped in government circles here that the republican parliament will announce its willingness to open direct negotiations in London for the future government of Southern Ireland, while attempting through other sources to make an arrangement with Ulster. The Ulster cabinet meeting was called for this afternoon.

Ireland and Argentina.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 5.—Laurence Ginnell, diplomatic representative of the "Irish republic parliament," who arrived in Argentina a few days ago, yesterday asked Foreign Minister Pueyrredon for permission to present his credentials. If this request is granted, it is reported that Ginnell will ask Argentina to recognize the Irish republic. Foreign Minister Pueyrredon has not yet answered the request and it is declared that in the meantime he is consulting James H. Macleay, the British minister to Argentina regarding the matter.

A. O. H. Resolutions.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 5.—Resolutions regarding the present Irish peace negotiations and stating that to compel by force of arms any part of the British Empire to remain a part of it is the negation of the principle upon which they consider the empire to be based were passed by the convention of the A. O. H. of the maritime provinces, which closes its sessions here last night. Cables expressing the joy of the maritime divisions of the order in their peace negotiations and condemning further resort to arms against Ireland were forwarded to David Lloyd George, British premier, and Eamon De Valera.

SEVERE DEFEAT FOR SPANIARDS

Madrid, Aug. 5.—Spanish forces have suffered a severe defeat in Northeastern Morocco, where they have been resisting heavy attacks by rebellious tribesmen, so it is declared by newspapers here.

MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE OUT OF LIQUOR CASE

Three Rivers, Que., Aug. 5.—Napoleon Blais, of this town, has been charged with manslaughter by E. Lariviere, provincial detective, who holds Blais and Mrs. Koles in connection with the death of John J. B. S. Germain, who died after having drunk liquor sold to him by Blais, which, it is contended, contained a certain percentage of wood alcohol.

BRUSSELS ST. WORK IS RECOMMENDED

Paving operations were recommenced in Brussels street this morning when a large crew from the New Brunswick Power Co. started to work again on the reconstruction of the street.

The track laying in Douglas avenue is about completed, and as soon as it is finished the entire crew from that section will be placed in Brussels street. It is the intention of the power company to lay new rails in Brussels street from Clarence street to Union, so Commissioner Frink announced this forenoon. He said that he would again take on as many men as could be employed in the street when the power company's men get far enough ahead to commence paving concrete. When one side was completed a start would be made on the other side of the street.

BARON BYNG'S TITLES (Special to Times.)

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—The names and titles of the new Governor General of Canada are given here officially this morning. They are as follows: General His Excellency Julian Hedworth George, Baron Byng, of Vimy, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada.

FLAHERTY AGAIN HEADS THE K. O.

San Francisco, Aug. 5.—James A. Flaherty, of Philadelphia, was unanimously re-elected today supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus. He had already served in that capacity six times.

The other officers elected are: Martin H. Carmody, Grand Rapids, Mich., deputy supreme knight; William J. McGinley, New York, supreme secretary; Joseph C. Pelletier, Boston, supreme advisor; Daniel J. Callahan, Washington, D. C., supreme treasurer; Dr. E. W. Buckley, St. Paul, Minn., supreme physician; David F. Supple, San Francisco, supreme warden.

For the next convention a strong sentiment has already been shown in favor of Montreal or some other Canadian city.

Archbishop Hanna of the San Francisco diocese spoke before the convention today on "The Campaign of the Catholic Church Against Lax Divorce Laws."

The chief business of the convention this afternoon was a discussion of the historical Commission programme. John H. Reddin of Denver announced a series of contests for prizes for work on original research in primary sources in the field of American history.

Edward P. McSwiney of Framingham, chairman of the Historical Commission, addressed the convention, the subject being "The American Nationality Movement as Seen from the Past to the Future." He declared that "it is notorious that for fifteen years an organized movement has been on foot to change American history by agreement" and that "it is a direct thrust at one of the bases of American nationality, ideal and solidarity."

"The movement," he said, "led to a call to arms of the fourth degree, K. of C. The fourth degree regards racial bigotry and religious hatred as well as the wiles of diplomatic intrigue as common enemies of American liberty and of national brotherhood."
