

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NEW INSTRUMENTS
ENGAGE ATTENTION

St. Mary's Band Gets First
Consignment of Seven—
On Exhibition in King
Street.

St. Mary's Band, which went overseas with the 140th Battallon, C. E. F., and later became the band of the P. P. C. L. Ps in France, has received the first consignment of their new instruments. Seven of the most important pieces have arrived and are now on exhibition in one of the windows of Macaulay Bros. & Co., Ltd. They are beautiful silver plated instruments, four bass and three altos, the latter finished in the French horn style. The background of the windows of decorated with flags and bunting and in the central foreground is a picture of the band's founder, the father of the present bandmaster, Harold Williams. On each side is a picture of the band, one taken in 1908 and the other in 1913.

The band consists of thirty-six mem—

The band was organized in 1908, and in the seventeen years has had an interesting history. They were given a set of instruments by the Daughters of the Empire, and public subscriptions, and went over as the band for the 140th Battalion, under Sergeant Charles Williams. Doing the band work for that battalion for a short while, they were transferred to the "Princess Pats" and went into the firing line with that famous regiment, and some of our boys were wounded and the leader, Charles Williams, killed. After the armistice they say they were promised instruments again but that promise was never fulfilled.

They re-organized again and are now working hard for a new and up-to-date set of instruments of their own, and have placed an order for them. Out of the last season's work they were able to pay for the first lot of instruments, and have them now in possession. They still have to raise money to pay for the balance of the order.

# SEE STEAMSHIPS

New Service by Houston Line -Hellenes First Here From Calcutta.

A new service is being operated, by the "Houston" Line from Canada to India and Far East. MORE NOVEMBER BERRIES
There reached the Times office today another unique specimen of nature's production for this time of year, a well developed raspberry branch with three ripe berries, as sweet and lucious as though picked in August. The leaves were green and fresh looking and there was nothing about the branch to indicate the advanced season. The berries were picked by George Martin of Randolph which may be advertised as havings to India and Far East. There were three sailings from Montreal this summer. The S. S. Halesius, which has just cleared the St. Lawrence for Karachi, Bombay, Colombo, Madras, Calcutta, Rangoon, Singapore, Batavia, Samarang and Socrabaya, finishes the summer season. The berries at the beginning of September, will load at Calcutta for St. John. She will bring a full cargo to this port, consisting chiefly of tea. This will be of great importance to the local importers, as they will now be able to get their goods delivered at their home port. This steamer will load for the Far East at the end of January and will call at the following ports:—Port Said, Suez, Port Sudan, Aden, Bombay, Colombo, Madras, Calcutta, Rangoon, Singapore, Batavia, Samarang and Socrabaya, finishes the summer season. The berries at the beginning of September, will load at Calcutta for St. John. She will bring a full cargo to this port, consisting chiefly of tea. This will be of great importance to the local importers, as they will now be able to get their goods delivered at their home port. This steamer will load for the Far East at the end of January and will call at the following ports:—Port Said, Suez, Port sailings from Montreal this summe


