and considered, but that which was looked upon as the most practical was one by A. O. Skinner that the city hold a big summer carnival week. A committee consisting of Mr. Skinner, E. A. Schofield and H. A. Porter of the exhibition association, was appointed to make enquiries and recommendations, their report to be acted upon at another meeting.

It is proposed to conduct a carnival week along the lines of an old home week, which would include, trade procession, including floats, athletics, firemen's muster, aeroplanes, warships, fireworks, excursions, picnics, etc.

and that large numbers of the war veterans would probably participate. It is probable that the Great War Veterans' Association will be invited to assist in arranging the plan.

The outstanding outrage of the whole evening was the wrecking of the shoe store at 21 Göttingen street owned by Mrs. Joanna Patton. Against her the soldiers could have no complaint. She is a respected resident of the North End, where she has done business for years. Her son, Henry Patton, is a returned soldier who went overseas with the first contingent and only recently returned from France.

The "upholders of freedom and justice" who led the mob of hoodlums, for no reason at all, save possibly for the pleasure of hearing the crash, smashed in the front windows and the door of Mrs. Patton's store, broke through the opening thus made, and ransacked the place. For ten minutes shoes rained on Göttingen street. The main store was completely wrecked, and a smaller store, one door south, also owned by Mrs. Patton, suffered the loss of its front window.

The Halifax Riot

Eight Arrests, Dozen in Hospitals; Alter Second Night of Trouble; Damage Estimate \$20,000

(Halifax Herald, Thursday) An outbreak of lawlessness and mob rule, which followed the raids on Chinese cafes of Tuesday night, again swept over Halifax last night. From 10.30 o'clock until midnight the city was practically at the mercy of a mob of soldiers and civilians. A hasty survey of the situation taken at midnight, when the police force, backed by the military and naval patrols and armed pickets from the Garrison Regiment and the Engineers, had succeeded in restoring a semblance of order, showed the following results of the night's destruction:

Nine stores wrecked; estimated damage, \$20,000. Eight prisoners in cells at Central police station. A dozen civilians and soldiers in various hospitals with more or less serious injuries, and hundreds of others with cut faces, torn clothing, and bleeding scalps. The net result of last evening's rioting is a total loss for every one concerned. The excuse offered for the wrecking of the Chinese cafes Tuesday night is so flimsy as to be worthless, but there is no excuse at all for last night's performance. Against such mobs as these, bent upon the wilful destruction of the property of innocent and law-abiding citizens it would appear that the civil police force is helpless; if this be the

pletely wrecked or suffered damage in a lesser degree were the Crown Cafe, a victim of the previous evening's outbreak, which lost its new plate glass window and door; the Union Cigar Store on Brunswick street, at the foot of Cogswell, Shaffer's ladies' wear store on Brunswick street, near the Union Store; Samuel Webber's shoe store on Buckingham street and Allen's fruit store at the corner of Argyle and Buckingham.

There was neither rhyme nor reason about last night's display of brute force. Some of the victims were Hebrews, and one is an Assyrian, but the attack on the Patton establishment is sufficient evidence that the mob was actuated by no desire save to smash, to break and to destroy. It is difficult to estimate the damage but it will hardly be less than \$20,000.

Preparations had been made to prevent the re-occurrence of the incidents of Tuesday, and the fact that the police were powerless to stop the mob until it had done its best to wreck the town, is evidence that the situation is beyond the limited powers of the civil authorities. Earlier in the day the police placed under arrest a man named Thomas
